Information Notice on the appointment of a Panel of Approved Assessors as required under the Solvents Regulations (S.I. No. 565 of 2012)

The revised regulations for solvents activities (including dry cleaning) required the EPA to set up a panel of approved assessors to replace the existing AIC inspection body system. These Approved Assessors will, from September 26th 2013, be the inspection body for the purposes of carrying out inspections under the regulations. The details of the panel of Approved Assessors are as follows:

Regulators should engage the services of the assessor and pay them directly. To obtain your certificate of compliance from your local authority you must then send a compliant assessor report along with the application form and fee to your local authority.

The EPA would also like to remind you of some of the new aspects of the regulations.

- Local Authorities can now issue certificates of compliance for up to 3 years rather than the
 previous 1-year period. However, certificates of shorter duration may be issued if a Local
 Authority has concerns about a specific installation 9including failure to renew certificates in
 time).
- Regardless of the duration of certificates, all operators are required to submit an annual selfassessment compliance report to their local authority. If you fail to submit a self-assessment annual report, you may not be allowed to renew your certificate until such time as any outstanding reports are submitted.
- The application fee payable by operators to their Local Authority has increased from €50 to €70 for new applications (but it remains at €50 for renewals). If an operator does not renew their certificate of compliance prior to its expiry date, they must then apply for a new certificate
- The fine for uncertified operators has increased from €3,000 to €5,000 or imprisonment for up to six months, or both
- A copy of your certificate of compliance must be displayed in a prominent position at your premises.

It is illegal for any uncertified operator to carry out an activity for which a certificate of compliance is required under these Regulations. Any such operator should arrange for an inspection immediately. It is expected that new legislation will be introduced shortly which will allow for fixed payment notices (i.e. 'on-the-spot fines') to be issued for any offence specified in the regulations.
