#### Message from **An Cathaoirleach**



Welcome to the latest edition of the dlr Times. This special celebrates the Council's 30th anniversary, providing a look at our history and our future.

In 1994 Dún Laoghaire Borough Council was abolished and Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council was formed. I was first elected as a Councillor in 1991 and have been fortunate to see many changes over the last 30 years first-hand.

The county expanded beyond Dún Laoghaire and now covers from Rathfarnham down to Bray. 28 Councillors made up this new Council, an increase from 15 in Dún Laoghaire Borough Council. As time passed and the population increased additional Councillors were added. I am currently one of 40 representing 6 electoral wards.

A new Chain of Office was created to represent O Chuan go Sliabh, from the Mountains to the Sea. Its imagery represents different aspects of our larger County: a Viking ship for maritime areas, an oak branch for the ancient wooded nature, a triangle for part of the Dublin mountains and more.

While many changes have occurred, our vision is to continue to create a progressive and vibrant County that is attractive, inclusive and accessible for everyone.

Through these actions, we aim to make a tangible difference in our County's response to climate change. Climate Change knows no boundaries, and collaboration with stakeholders in our County and surrounding local authorities is essential.

The Community Climate Action Fund, with over €883k available, will support community-led projects addressing energy, travel, food waste, recycling, and local climate action.

Key elements of our climate action strategy are buying electric vehicles where possible or, alternatively, vehicles powered by biodiesel, all street lighting being efficient, and maintaining its ISO 50001 standard for energy efficiency. We also promote a Digital First approach to delivering our services, putting as much of our business and application processes online as possible and providing opportunities for our employees to undertake blended working to improve their quality of life and reduce our travel related climate impacts.

The Decarbonising Zone of Dún Laoghaire and Blackrock will serve as a model for emission reductions and sustainable practices. By embracing the ten-minute neighbourhood concept, we aim to create a community where essential services are accessible by walking, cycling, or public transport. This approach will enhance the quality of life for all residents and visitors in our County.

# A message from An Cathaoirleach, Denis O'Callaghan

2024 is underway and so are many projects and events to benefit citizens and communities in our County.

Last year we exceeded housing targets, delivering over 900 homes between the build programme, Part V, leasing, HAP and RAS. This is a great achievement that I hope to see continue. Progress is already being made on social housing delivery as we recently opened 27 Part V social homes in Kiltiernan Wood with Minister for Housing Darragh O'Brien and Tuath. 24 additional cost rental homes will be

delivered in phase 1, with a further 48 homes early this year. I am glad to hear that the first affordable purchase homes in Shanganagh, the largest social and affordable scheme in the Country, will be available this year.

We are committed to making communities more environmentally responsible and energy-efficient and there was a fantastic turnout at the recent Community Climate Action Programme workshop. We have over €883k available for community climate

projects and I look forward to seeing the implementation of innovative projects that work in hand with our Climate Action Plan 2024-2029. We also hosted the Zero Emission Buildings Summit earlier this year which was a great success.

As we look towards the future preservation of history is key. I was pleased to meet attendees at the inaugural dlr People's Archive Day, hosted by our Heritage Section, which provided expert information and advice on caring for family memorabilia and historic records.

Inclusion remains at the forefront of many projects. # A message from Chief Executive, Frank Curran

It has been a busy start to the year with the adoption of the Climate Action Plan by our elected members. The new plan sets out to actively inform and engage residents, workers, and visitors to our county on taking action through innovative partnerships and programmes. By working together, we can reduce greenhouse gas emissions and mitigate the impacts of climate change.

We have installed air quality sensors across the county, to further improve our understanding of local air quality. We aim to foster a collaborative effort towards

cleaner and healthier air quality for all. This year we been allocated €22 million from the NTA to progress 46 schemes to support the rollout of cycling and walking infrastructure. As part of our commitment to delivering improved tree cover and native forests, we aim to plant 10,000 native trees this Spring with the help of community volunteers.

This year we will be appointing a design Team to produce a Dún Laoghaire

Harbour Masterplan to guide the development of the Harbour into the future. The design and planning phase of the proposed National Watersports Campus will start this year with the ultimate aim to increase participation in all watersports through the provision of high-quality infrastructure. This year 89 cruise ships will call to Dún Laoghaire Harbour bringing a total of 143,000 passengers and 61,000 crew to the area.

The Failte Ireland funded Killiney beach facility will proceed to Part 8 planning this year. The proposed facility will include hot showers, changing and toilet facilities, secure storage, induction spaces, equipment washdown and orientation points for watersports enthusiasts. New libraries are under construction at Stillorgan & Ballyogan and a proposed new swimming pool and gym at the Samuel Beckett Centre will go to Part 8 this year.

In housing, we aim to be on-site in Glenamuck and Ballyogan this year to progress social and cost rental homes. In Cherrywood 4,896 homes have been granted permission, with approximately 1.396 completed and 635 under construction. The accessibility ramp will be completed this year which will improve access to the Dún Laoghaire Baths. The contract is also due to be signed on the Glenamuck Distributor Road Scheme.

We have a variety of events coming up including the Eggscapade at Blackrock Park and Coastival returns this Summer. I hope you and your family will take some time to enjoy our parks and natural spaces as we start to enjoy the beginning of Spring.

## **Ratepayers Support Grant for 2024**

Our Budget for 2024 retained numerous grants and supports for businesses including the Ratepayers Support Grant for eligible ratepayers whose 2024 rates bill is less than €20,000. Grant payments are graduated depending on the level of rates payable and the grant varies from 8% to 14%. To qualify for the Ratepayers Support Grant, you must pay in full by 1st



July, 2024 or sign up to pay your rates by direct debit prior to that date. If you sign up to pay by direct debit and subject to meeting the other terms and conditions of the scheme, your grant will be applied automatically to your account this year by reducing your November and December direct debt payment.

## Air sensors installed across Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown

We have installed air quality sensors across Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, to further improve our understanding of local air quality. Currently, four sensors are available, with more to be added this year. These new sensors are specifically designed to measure crucial air pollutants such as Particulate Matter (PM) and Nitrogen Dioxide, as well as providing real-time weather data. With the installation of these sensors, we aim to foster a collaborative effort towards cleaner and healthier air quality



for all. The data collected will empower people who live, work, and visit the county with insights into air quality, assisting in the development of informed decisions and proactive measures to address air pollution concerns. ## **Increased Cost of Business** (ICOB) Grant available for small & medium sized businesses!

As part of Budget 2024, the Government signed off on a package of €257m for the Increased Cost of Business (ICOB) Grant as a vital measure for small and medium businesses. This initiative is funded by the Department of Enterprise, Trade & Employment.

The grant is available to qualifying businesses as a contribution towards the rising costs faced by businesses and is based on the value of your Commercial Rates bill from 2023.

For qualifying businesses with a 2023 Commercial Rate bill of <€10,000, the ICOB grant will be paid at a rate of 50% of the business's Commercial Rate bill for 2023 and for qualifying businesses with a 2023 Commercial Rate bill of between €10,000 and €30,000, the ICOB grant will be €5,000.

Eligible businesses will receive a once-off grant payment. The amount of the grant payable to eligible businesses is based on the value of the Commercial Rates bill the business received in 2023. However, it is not a Commercial Rates waiver and businesses should continue to pay their Commercial Rates bill as normal.

The dlr Sports Partnership Team is excited to announce their continued efforts in promoting physical activity and sports participation in the community. Last year, they organised and delivered a wide range of training




courses, workshops, and targeted physical activity programmes for all ages, reaching over 11,200 participants.

## Your County's Evolution!

The origins of the Irish county structure can be traced back to the Anglo-Norman invasion of the 12th century. The boundaries we are familiar with today were fully in place by 1606 with the formation of Wicklow. In the mountains, the O'Byrnes (later owners of Cabinteely House) and the O'Tooles had held out against the new county order. What is now Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown had been partly within The Pale and partly "Beyond The Pale"- parts of the Pale boundary ditch are still visible here.

By the 19th century, the area was made up of four Townships and one Rural District: Blackrock, Dalkey, Killiney & Ballybrack, Kingstown (Dún Laoghaire from 1920) and Rathdown Rural District no. 1. Three major administrative changes have given us the current county:

- In 1930, the four townships became Dún Laoghaire Borough Corporation (with fifteen elected members).
- In 1985, three electoral counties were formed and sat as Dublin County Council with a total of seventy eight elected members (of which fifteen specifically represented Dún Laoghaire Borough Corporation).
- In 1994, Dublin County Council was abolished, and the three current counties: Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown, Fingal and South Dublin were formed. The new Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council met for the first time on 10th January 1994, with all twenty-eight elected representatives present. Their number increased to forty at the time of the 2014 Local Elections.

Following extensive remodeling and expansion, Dún Laoghaire Town Hall became Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Hall, and officially opened in 1997, when Council staff, who had been scattered in temporary offices throughout the town, were finally brought together. At the same time, an office was opened in Dundrum to accommodate the needs of people throughout the enlarged County. County Hall was further renovated in 2018, and a new Council Chamber was opened to accommodate all of the Elected Members, as well as customers.




While Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown is the smallest administrative county in the State by area (126.1km²), at the time of the last Local Elections, in 2019, we hit the national headlines as the first in the history of the State to have 50:50 split of men and women Councillors.

The county stretches from the outskirts of Bray to the edge of Booterstown Marsh on the coast, with UCD and Marlay Park at the boundaries with South Dublin and Dublin City, and Tibradden and Glencullen at its highest points — truly Ó Chuan go Sliabh. The new County Crest was adopted, after public consultation, in 1993, with symbols representing aspects of the county's history;

- the Oak Branch symbolizes nature and woodlands, with a commitment to conservation,
- the Irish Crown recalls King Laoghaire and the Borough crest,
- the Shamrock comes from the old seal of the Rathdown area,
- the Viking Ship recalls the coastal history and the Mountain and the Waves tie in with the area and with the County Motto.

In 2008, the official Heraldic Crest was complemented by the introduction of the dlr brand, which visually represents both the Crest and the Motto, and is used universally today.

## Looking ahead to the future

As we look to the future, Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council will continue to invest in resilient local economies and enhance the quality of life for our residents. With a population of over 233,000 and anticipated growth to 250,000 by 2031, the county offers some of the best natural, cultural, and sporting amenities in Ireland. Our current budget of €275 million enables us to deliver over 1,000 services, including housing, planning, transport, infrastructure, parks, culture, creativity, environmental protection, and climate action. This also allows us to provide numerous community amenities that enrich the lives of our citizens.

#### Housing

Our County Development Plan has zoned land to accommodate up to 26,000 new homes over the next five years. It includes growth in the existing neighbourhoods, the new mixed-use district of Cherrywood and the strategic employment location of Sandyford. The theme of



connectivity continues with the concept of the ten-minute neighbourhood, where people can walk, cycle or use public transport to access their day-to-day needs in new residential communities at Old Connaught, Rathmichael, Woodbrook, Shanganagh, Kiltiernan, Glenamuck and Ballyogan. The new town of Cherrywood, Ireland's largest urban infrastructure project located in the Cherrywood Strategic Development zone, is projected to have a population of 25,000 residents, more than 8,000 new homes, a retail-led town centre, six new schools, three major parks, and three LUAS stops.



#### **Climate First**

Our 'Climate First' approach is fundamental to development; our Decarbonising Zones in Blackrock and Dún Laoghaire will become exemplars for locally led projects as we play our part in transitioning to a climate resilient, biodiversity rich, environmentally sustainable and climate neutral economy by 2050. We are the first Dublin Local Authority to comply with the ISO50001 Energy Management System. We are currently retrofitting all of our social housing stock and 100% of our public lighting will be LED. We are upgrading our public buildings, swimming pools and social housing with sustainable options as we move away from fossil fuels. This is highlighted by our award-winning

housing for older persons at Beaufort which saw an increase in BER ratings from an E1 to an A3 rating and a significant reduction in calculated energy use of approx 80% on the pre-energy usage. Construction continues at Shanganagh Castle Estate on 597 social, cost rental and affordable homes; the largest residential scheme in Ireland certified to the passive house standard, with the scheme's hot water and low heating demand provided by a heat pump-based district heating system.



#### **Active Travel, Air Quality and Better Public Spaces**

With more than 20,000 users per week, our award-winning Coastal Mobility Cycle (CMR) Route in Dún Laoghaire town connects urban villages, bathing places, walks and parks and encourages local commuter and recreational cycling. Our Active Travel routes will continue to build more effective linkages to connect our local towns, improve air quality and create better public spaces.

#### **Dún Laoghaire Harbour**

Dún Laoghaire Harbour is embarking on an exciting transformation that will pave the way for a vibrant and inclusive future. The Harbour Master Plan and the establishment of a National Watersports Campus will revolutionise the harbour, turning it from a traditionally industrial port into a people-focused space that benefits the entire community. This transformation aligns with the town's vision of becoming a premier maritime, tourism, and economic destination. These initiatives will not only enhance the harbour's appeal but also contribute to the overall growth and prosperity of Dún Laoghaire and surrounding areas.



#### Parks, Playgrounds and **Recreational Spaces**

From west to east, our parks, playgrounds and recreational spaces focus on nature and wellbeing for residents and visitors including our flagship parks at Cabinteely and Marlay Park, three new parks in Cherrywood and Fernhill Parks and Garden which has a unique collection of gardens, woodland and agricultural



land. With more than 1,100,000 visitors to our libraries annually, work has commenced on new libraries in Stillorgan and Ballyogan, including a wide range of cultural and creative opportunities, dedicated sensory spaces and a music studio.

Maintaining our emphasis on delivering our corporate priorities will give everyone in our communities, irrespective of age or ability, the opportunity to connect, participate and enjoy life to the full, ensuring that our county is one of the best places in which to live, work and visit well into the future.

I was never a breakfast man, when I first joined Dublin Corporation, it was a cup of tea and a cigarette sitting by a cosingas heater. I have now advanced to coffee and a slice of toast with real butter and marmalade with underfloor heating.

#### What do you do?

I was appointed as a Neutral Facilitator to work inhouse equally and fairly with both Unions, Management & Staff for areas of mutual gains achieved by consensus.

#### What is your typical work day?

While always busy, as I work solo, I don't have one a typical day. It varies day by the day, as the Partnership Committee decide on project activities and events which I progress.

#### Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council is 30 years old this year, what are some of the major changes have you seen?

Probably better working conditions, for example back in the day many of us outdoor workers sat in tin huts, PPE was limited and poor, great to see them days gone! Also, the breaking down of barriers between indoor/outdoor staff. Our Partnership Committee consists of grades from G.O.s & C.O.'s to members of the Management Team, however at the meeting table, they are all equal voices and options.

#### What is the most difficult part of your Job?

It was tough during Covid as real people around a table was a key part of many Partnership successes over the years. Team or Zoom does not replace human connection face to face. As long as there is something that needs to be done, I am on duty!

#### What is the most rewarding part of your Job?

Loving the Job is number one, working with amazing people across the services, the support from both Unions and Management for the Partnership process here in dlr, seeing so many staff over the years really appreciative the benefits of same.

#### **Favourite Places to visit?**

Deansgrange graveyard — I call once a week to visit my mum's grave reflecting on great memories of old, always walk different routes, pass graves of former colleagues such as Larry Galligan, Tommy Mullally, a quick hello there, a short prayer there, the place is buzzing with history, memories, sadness and an acknowledgement it's the final stopping point. Then into the amazing tea room where Patricia & Fiona (always with a smile) serve freshly baked on-site real pastries, real tea no fancy coffees, no click and pay, only real money.

What's the last thing you do before you go to sleep? Turn out the light!





#### dlr Libraries: services to Schools



dlr Libraries offer a range of services, resources, and outreach facilities available to all teachers and students in the dlr area. These are available to all pre-schools, primary, second level and special educational needs schools located in the dlr area. Visit our website libraries.dlrcoco.ie to find out more.

#### **Teachers' Card**

A special category of membership is available to teachers which allows you to supplement your classroom library with stock from any of our libraries. All teachers that work in the Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown area can avail of our teachers' card facility from their local dlr Library. To obtain one of these you must present proof of address (a current utility bill, etc.) and a letter from your school principal on headed paper stating that you are currently employed there. You may collect items and books from the branch library of your choice. The Teachers' card allows you to borrow up to 40 items for an extended period of 12 weeks.

#### **Classroom Sets**

We have over 6,000 items in our dlr classroom set collection. The sets are of varying sizes, from 10 to 30 copies, some suitable for primary school classes, some for smaller secondary school groups. Sets may be borrowed for 3 months at a time. Teachers who wish to borrow classroom sets must have a Teachers' Card. You may collect the books from the branch library of your choice.
