Welcome back Dún Laoghaire Baths

The re-opening of the Dún Laoghaire Baths today is a significant milestone for the Council and the people of the town. This well-known landmark has been an important part of the history and heritage of families all over the County. Once again, we can welcome back visitors to this popular bathing area. This newly restored public amenity will facilitate swimming, water sports, and be a great space for events.

The works included the refurbishment of the baths pavilion, the construction of a new 35m jetty with built in seating, installation of the Roger Casement Statue, a simple changing shelter, the refurbished Edwardian gazebo in the beach garden and a new walkway from Newtownsmith. The former pavilion building has also been substantially refurbished to provide studio space for artists, as well as a gallery and a café with a spectacular view of Scotsman's Bay. There are also toilet facilities, including a "changing places" bathroom, which is for people with additional needs.

The project was guided by dlr's policy of improving public realm and linking the sea front with the town centre. It complements and is linked to the People's park, the Lexicon library and The Metals.

The Dún Laoghaire Baths revival is now complete, at least for now and is at the heart of it all again in this unique coastal location.

Artists' Studios

Coinciding today with the launch of the Dún Laoghaire Baths, the dlr Arts Office are now seeking artists to apply for the new workspaces. There are four awards currently available to support local artists with rent free, purposebuilt artist workspaces and project funding. Further information can be found <u>here</u>.



The Dún Laoghaire Baths Exhibition 1843 – 2023

Level 3, dlr LexIcon, Dún Laoghaire

There will be an exhibition of the Dún Laoghaire Baths to mark the opening and to celebrate the 180th anniversary of their original opening.

The exhibition is a pictorial celebration of life, work and play in the baths. From their origins as a private enterprise, through the Edwardian redevelopment by the Urban District Council, and covering heydays and dereliction through to present day. It charts the highs and lows of this much-loved local institution – swimming lessons, sunbathing paradise, childhood freedom, protests, ice creams and fun park. Told through the images and the voices of those who lived, worked and played in the Dún Laoghaire Baths over many years, the exhibition will bring the past to life, while looking to the next chapter in the life of this iconic Dún Laoghaire attraction.

A message from Chief Executive, Frank Curran

As I look back on my first year as Chief Executive, I am reminded of all the positive change that has happened in the County over 2022. Since taking up my role, I have been working with local councillors and our senior management team on a wide range of service areas and strategic priorities. I have been out meeting with staff, sectoral stakeholders, local businesses and the local community.

Early in the year elected members adopted our County Development Plan (CDP) 2022-2028 which will ensure there is enough zoned land to accommodate up to 26,000 new homes over the next six years. It also includes growth in the existing neighbourhoods, the new mixed-use district of Cherrywood, the strategic employment location of Sandyford and in new residential communities at Old Connaught, Rathmichael, Woodbrook, Shanganagh, Kiltiernan, Glenamuck & Ballyogan. The vision of the CDP centres around the ten-minute neighbourhood concept which aims to ensure that people can walk, cycle or use public transport to access their day-to-day needs and services.

In Cherrywood 640 homes have been completed, 1400 are currently under construction with a further 1500 homes the subject of live planning applications. Three Parks have been fully completed and will open shortly. The permanent structure for the first primary school is reaching the final stages of construction and four LUAS stops are now in place.

An Taoiseach Mícheál Martin turned the sod on the construction of 597 homes on nine hectares at the Shanganagh Castle Estate. The first homes will be constructed in 2024 and will consist of affordable, cost rental and social housing units.

Early in the year elected members adopted our County Development Plan (CDP) 2022-2028 which will ensure there is enough zoned land to accommodate up to 26,000 new homes over the next six years. The Blackglen Road Project is now nearing completion and the Glenamuck Distributor Road Scheme will go to tender in 2023.

Fernhill Park and Gardens have seen the addition of a new avenue, car parking, active recreation space and a dog park. A new entrance and accessible access has been added to Killiney Park.

Progress continues on our Active Travel routes to build a better network to connect our local towns, improve air quality and create better spaces for us all to enjoy. There are now 20,000 users per week using the Coastal Mobility Route, a segregated 2-way cycleway from Newtown Avenue in Blackrock to Sandycove and the Forty Foot bathing area. Work continues on the Stillorgan Village Movement Plan.

dlr supported the Sandyford Innovation Summit in September which focused on decarbonisation and its impact on businesses and the general public. This included the last mile hub/mobility island concept which is a pivotal part of Sandyford Business District's Project Green Plan.

Dún Laoghaire received the Great Town 2022 award from the Academy of Urbanism. The Great Places Urbanism Awards are the Academy's primary platform for recognising and celebrating outstanding examples of good urbanism across the UK, Ireland and Europe. The town was also named as the one of the cleanest in the Country by the IBAL survey which is a wonderful credit to our outdoor cleansing staff work who hard to keep all our local towns and parks looking great. Work has started on the refurbishment and upgrade of Myrtle Square and the Old Carnegie Library in Dún Laoghaire will come back into use as IADT take up residence in the town. On the Tourism front, Cruise Liners have returned to Dún Laoghaire with over 70 arriving during the year. The future of the Joyce Museum has been secured with the signing of a new collaboration between the Council and the Joyce Tower and Museum and Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown is now a key part of the Dublin Coastal Trail developed by Fáilte Ireland in co-operation with the four Local Authorities.

In November, the Annual Budget 2023 for €236.5 million was adopted by our elected members. Here at dIr, we are committed to providing the best possible service delivery to ensure that our county continues to be attractive, inclusive and accessible for all through 2023.

I joined An Cathaoirleach, Councillor Mary Hanafin in December to officially open the Dún Laoghaire Baths. This was a significant day for our local community, and I hope locals and visitors will enjoy this public amenity for many years, and through many generations to come.

Please join in with some of the wonderful events on this Christmas, including movies and festive walks in our parks. I hope that you and your family will be out enjoying the atmosphere and I wish you all a very Happy Christmas & a peaceful new year.

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council are putting the environment top of their Christmas list this year by making greener, eco-friendly choices. Living Christmas trees and fairylike forest walks all aglow, generators fuelled by Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil, extra low voltage LED's and Christmas tree lights lit by pedal powered on the iconic bandstand on the pier inviting people to 'keep her lit' for the festive season.

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown twinkles and glows this year with exciting 3D light installations, fairylike forest walks at Marlay Park and Cabinteely Park and several buildings are bathed with a magical glow. Lots of activities are outdoors inviting people to wrap up warm, get out in the crisp clean air, soak up the festive spirit and go 'walking in a winter wonderland'.

This year, pedal power will also take centre stage with a twinkling Christmas tree on the iconic bandstand on the pier from 4pm to 8pm on Sat 10 Dec, Sun 11 Dec, Sat 17 Dec and Sun 18 Dec which lights up as people cycle a bike to 'keep her lit' for the festive season.



Christmas Walking Trails -Marlay and Cabinteely Park

The very popular illuminated Christmas walking trails in Marlay Park and Cabinteely Park walking trails are free to attend and open from 4pm to 8pm Monday to Friday from end of November. They are fully accessible for wheelchairs and buggies and are an oasis of calm beneath the twinkling lights away from the hustle and bustle of Christmas. Where possible, all official dlr Christmas trees are living trees and their lights are LED extra low voltage for safety only using 4.8 watts of electricity.

Christmas Movies Ferry Terminal, Dún Laoghaire

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown residents and visitors will also be able to buckle up, pop some popcorn and tick another bucket list family adventure with a trip to the outdoor movies at the Ferry Terminal. 

Budget 2023

The dlr Annual Budget 2023 commits to an investment of €236.5 million in the delivery of high quality services for the citizens of this county next year, which equates as a spend of approximately €1k per person.

In November, the Elected Members for Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council voted to adopt Budget 2023.

The annual revenue Budget provides funding for a very broad range of services from road, cycle lane and foot path maintenance, energy efficient streetlighting, enhancing our parklands, sports and community facilities, developing biodiversity and heritage initiatives as well as providing grants for local businesses. The budget also provides for the maintenance and repair of the Council's assets including its houses, corporate buildings, parks and Dún Laoghaire Harbour.

Expansion of services

There will be an increase in several budget areas that are subject to high demand including housing maintenance, footpath repairs, road patching programme, weed control, gully repairs and parks. The demand for enhanced public realm and outdoor amenities has grown sharply since the onset of Covid and increased provision has also been made to maintain these areas, which has the dual benefit of responding to the demand of residents but also supports business through increased footfall in the towns and villages across the county. Other areas which saw an increase were LEO grants, disability summer camps, dlr Events, tourism, WI-FI and digital initiatives.





Check the Register



The Register of Electors process has changed. The Electoral Reform Act 2022 came into effect in October 2022. The Draft and Live Registers have now been replaced by a Rolling Register of Electors. The Rolling Register will be continuously updated.

It is important that you check that your details / voting status are correct and that you are registered only once.

PPSN/ Date of Birth/Eircode: If you are already registered to vote under the new legislation you are now required to add your PPSN, Date of Birth and Eircode.

Age: Every resident aged 18 years and upwards is entitled to be on the register. A person may register from 16 years of age, however they will not be eligible to vote until they are 18.

No fixed abode: If you have no fixed address you can still register online at <u>www.checktheregister.ie</u> or by completing an ERF1 form. Please contact us if you would like further information at <u>registerofelectors@dlrcoco.ie</u> or call us at 01-2054880.

Citizenship Voting Rights:

- Irish Irish Citizens: may vote at every election and Referendum
- British British Citizens: may vote at Dáil and Local Elections
- British/EU Citizen: may vote at Dáil, European and Local Elections
- **EU:** European Citizens may vote at European and Local Elections
- Non-EU Non-European Citizens: may vote at Local Elections

Residential Zoned Land Tax (**RZLT**)


The Government's Housing For All – A New Housing Plan for Ireland proposed a new tax to activate vacant land for residential purposes as a part of the pathway to increasing new housing supply. <u>The Residential Zoned Land Tax (RZLT)</u> was introduced by the Finance Act 2021. The process to identify land to which the tax applies is now underway. The tax will be payable to the Revenue Commissioners from 2024.

dlr has prepared a draft map of the land considered to meet the relevant criteria for the RZLT. The map was published on 1 November 2022 and is required to reflect the situation on the ground as of 1 October, 2022.

dlr PPN Vision Statement for Community Wellbeing

In December, the Dún Laoghaire Rathdown Public Participation Network launched their Vision Statement for Community Wellbeing including key findings and themes communicated by their members. The report, mandated by the Department of Rural and Community Development, identifies core issues that member groups and the wider Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown community consider important for their community "to be the best that it can be for this and future generations".

Construction starts at Shanganagh for 597 social and affordable homes



Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council, in partnership with the Land Development Agency (LDA) have started construction on the largest public housing scheme in the State in recent years at Shanganagh, Shankill, Co Dublin.

The homes will be 100% affordable, with 51% cost rental (306 homes), 15% affordable purchase (91 homes) and 34% social housing (200 homes). The development will offer a mix of accommodation suitable for single people, couples, and families with 99 of the new homes to have 3 bedrooms.

The development will be the largest residential scheme certified to achieve the 'passive house' low energy use standard which has significantly lower energy consumption and associated heating costs compared to other new builds. Sustainability features include very low energy demand, low car parking provision (0.54 spaces per home), high bicycle parking provision of over 1,300 spaces, and design features to make working from home easier.

The development will be served by a range of amenities including extensive communal green space, a playground, a crèche, a convenience store and café.

It is planned that the first homes will be available by the end of 2024.

Significant energy upgrades to designated older persons accommodation

Eighty-two properties in our housing stock have received energy upgrades in 2022 under the Energy Efficiency / Retrofitting Programme.

All of the eighty-two properties included in the programme of works are designated as older persons accommodation. The upgrade works carried out on each property include external insulation, new doors and windows, solar panels, heating system upgrades and attic insulation.



Prior to the energy upgrades, the properties had BER ratings as low as F and G. With the works now complete, 63 of the properties have achieved an A rating with the other 19 achieving a B rating.

Pictured are some of the properties in our Beaufort Development in Glasthule where 58 properties have been upgraded. As part of the works in Beaufort, the existing gas fired district heating system was replaced with a new district heating system containing eight air to water heat pumps. This is the first and only development in the Country with a district heating system to be upgraded under the national Energy Efficiency / Retrofitting programme.

dlr staff profile

PROPERTY REFERENCER

What do you do?

I am one of two Property Referencers (Property and Title Researchers) employed by dlr. Our role is to investigate property and land ownership on behalf of any Council Department which requires this service and report our findings. We would also work generally across the Council where any questions of property / land ownership is an issue.

What is your typical work day like?

My work day is dictated by the type of cases which come in, and these vary greatly from potentially dangerous structures, derelict sites, or longer term Infrastructure projects. The work roughly divides into investigation and research of title / ownership, and report writing our findings to the client department. In addition to Land Registry some of the other repositories I would work at are primarily The Registry of Deeds, Valuations Office, National Archives, The Courts Service Probate Office, and occasionally the National Library, or our own Local Studies Library at the Lexicon. I would also make site visits to make on the ground assessments as well as meeting with Colleagues from a number of disciplines within the Council to progress property / land cases. We would also be required to attend Court to verify our findings in legal cases.

What is the most difficult part of your job?

The older Registry of Deeds system of Registration is a difficult system to work with, and we still come across a lot of unregistered land within the County in the course of our work. The Registry of Deeds operates a Grantors / Sellers index, and bizarrely for a repository of transactions relating to Land and Property, does not include any map (with a few exceptions). Therefore there is job satisfaction in getting an accurate picture of ownership and resolution to these cases, considering the challenges of Registry of Deeds system.

Heirloom An exhibition of new work by Rachel Doolin

Heirloom is an installation of new works created by artist Rachel Doolin. The work manifests from a culmination of experiential research undertaken during an arctic based residency programme, and has been subsequently informed by a creative partnership with Irish Seed Savers Association.

In 2017, Doolin embarked on a research residency to Longyearbyen, an industrial frontier town situated in Svalbard, a remote arctic archipelago. Here, buried deep beneath a permafrost mountain lies a backup of the world's largest collection of agricultural biodiversity, cryogenically preserved within the Svalbard Global Seed Vault. As risks from the climate crisis and global conflict escalate, seed banks are becoming increasingly considered a precious resource that could one day prevent a worldwide food crisis.

Heirloom presents a series of visual, installation and digital based works that celebrates the 'profundity of seeds' by exploring the human thread that articulates the connection between our past, present and future, and places the humble seed as a profound nexus in the nature-culture relationship.

Heirloom is presented by Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council and supported by an Arts Council of Ireland Visual Arts Project Award.

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
