The building is approximately 5 minutes' walk from Dún Laoghaire Dart Station and bus stops. There is bike parking directly outside dlr Lexlcon at Moran Park and beside the pond at Haigh Terrace. Martina O'Brien brittle record

14 February - 2 April

Bringing together new video installations, printmaking, animation and archival material, this exhibition draws on O'Brien's time spent on marine expedition residencies in Oslofjord, Norway and the Arctic Ocean. It was developed in part through engagement with marine geochemistry, marine biology and marine ecology experts. The work also pays close attention to coastal and underwater environments in Dún Laoghaire and the Irish Sea.

O'Brien was awarded a dlr Visual Art Commission; this is funded by the Arts Council of Ireland and supported by Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council.



Vanessa Donoso López A rock can hurt you, a rock can help you open a nut.

12 April – 22 June

Over recent years across Ireland and Spain, Vanessa Donoso López has shaped her latest installation-a gathering of works deeply rooted in the land, its people and their shared cultural heritage. This collection, comprising over 1,000 pieces, includes archaeological artifacts and a series of marbled shapes that echo the intricate patterns found on petrified objects and rocks.

Migrant journeys often oscillate between physical dislocation and virtual connection, the creation and experience of physical objects offers an anchor to the real world. Like a rock that can wound or serve, the migrant's relationship with the land is one of duality-offering grounding and uncertainty, refuge and resistance.

Maeve McCarthy RHA Returning

5 July - 3 September

Maeve McCarthy's exhibition Returning explores themes of place, memory, and belonging, drawing from her childhood in the borough. Her maternal grandparents moved to Sandycove from Dublin inner city in the 1930s, deepening McCarthy's generational connection to the landscape. Now living back in the inner city, McCarthy reflects on how memory and place shape identity. Through large scale oil paintings, charcoal drawings, smaller works, and a film projection, she reimagines the built landscape, gardens, shortcuts, and wild spaces, inviting viewers to consider their own ties to place.

McCarthy was awarded a dlr Visual Art Commission funded by the Arts Council of Ireland and supported by Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council.

Karen Ebbs The Audacity of Hope An Outer Reflection of an Inner Reality

12 September - 9 November

In this installation of large-scale colourful oil paintings, sculptures and plexiglass mirrors, Karen Ebbs explores ideas relating to reflection, perception and reality. Using mirrors, the boundaries between exhibit and individual collapse. Visitors are confronted with their own reflections as they become interwoven with the artworks. They will become the observers and the actors, the object and the subject. Through this interaction visitors become part of an ever-changing installation which is continuously altered by their presence. This idea challenges the notion of separation and how we perceive ourselves, offering visitors the opportunity to "pause".
