Street Bin Review

April 2025



Introduction

Annual reviews related to the street bin service are conducted by the Cleansing Section of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council, with the last one taking place in March of 2024. Each review looks at the distribution of bins across the county, the frequency of individual bin collections, the misuse of bins at some locations and the requests for removal or installation of bins since the previous review.

The bin service is a critical service within the county and requires constant vigilance and staffing to ensure that bins are emptied and maintained in a timely fashion. Areas of heavy footfall due to the likes of social events or indeed day to day events can add pressures to the bin service and the demands can therefore be dynamic at times.

The importance of this service is highlighted in DLRs Corporate Plan 2025-2029, where the councils' priorities for its public realms are outlined. Under Strategic Pillar No.4– "Economic Development and Tourism"– it states we seek to enhance the public realm in our towns and urban villages. And under Strategic Pillar No.5– "Operational Excellence"– it states we must focus on providing high quality maintenance in our public realm. The efficient management of our bin service directly aligns with these objectives, as it ensures the public realms stay a litter-free and attractive for all to enjoy. This document is a non-exhaustive synopsis on the 'bin service' which outlines the findings of the 'April 2025 Street Bin Review'.

Street Bin Service During 2024

At the time of writing this report, the Cleansing Section maintains the following street bins;




Figure 1 (a): Locations of 450 Smart Bins on DLR Streets – March 2024.

- A stock of 450No. Smart Bins, as shown in Figure 1 (a). The original figure in 2015 was 300No. bins. Future considerations need to be more in line with waste reduction measures and upgrading/replacing existing bins within the County as opposed to continuing to increase the stock of bins. Cleansing inspect the existing fleet of Smart Bins and prepare a Program for gradual replacement of the the fleet.
- 14No. old style metal bins are located at beaches and areas where there's a risk of vandalism or in areas which are difficult to reach.
- 13No. dog waste bins are in service along coastal locations where it is not feasible to place a Smart Bin.
- During the summer period of 2024, Cleansing put into service 14No. barrel bins and 9No. 1100L bins across the County to alleviate the pressure on the Big Belly service.

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- At present, 25No. Recycling Bins are in service within the county. Any further bin purchases or trials will require funding.
- 10 pizza bins are in service within the county.
- 16No. Smart Bins have been removed from service because of damage. 15No. of them were burnt out and reported to the Gardaí and 1No. was damaged during the construction works. 1No. Temporary Barrel Bin was damaged by fire at Killiney Beach.
- All Big Belly Bins are fitted with sensors which provide real-time feedback via a GSM telemetry system that monitors the waste levels within the bins. Alerts are triggered when a bin is near or at capacity thus increasing bin collection efficiency.
- Circa 90% of Smart Bins are fitted with either internal or external ashtrays. All new bins are supplied with internal ashtrays. Cleansing continue to install external ashtrays on old bins.

Pizza Bins

Outdoor eating continues to be a popular activity with the knock-on effect that Big Belly bin hoppers can become blocked with pizza boxes thus rendering partially empty bins unusable. In 2021, DLR installed a series of pizza bins at strategic locations across the County in order to tackle the high number of Big Belly bins that were becoming blocked on a regular basis. The installation of the pizza bins has helped greatly, and DLR have maintained 10 pizza bins at the locations listed below throughout 2024.

Dog Waste Bins

Cleansing aim to encourage a culture shift in public attitudes towards litter and dog fouling and thereby instil personal responsibility on the public to look after their waste generated whilst in the public domain in a responsible manner. This is achieved through promotion of anti-dog fouling campaigns and the adequate provision of both Smart Bins and dog waste bins. 13No. dog waste bins are in service along coastal locations where it is not feasible to place a Smart Bins, in which dog waste can be disposed of. These criterions include the consideration of whether the bin would be at high risk of misuse through the disposal of domestic waste in locations such as residential areas. Therefore, both Smart Bins and dog waste bins are not prioritised in residential locations. Locations close to schools, shops and shopping areas are generally prioritised.

Seasonal Demands

In the years following the COVID 19 pandemic, we experienced the closure of several restaurants, which brought about a normalisation of take-out meals and consequently a surge in waste generation in the public realm. These changes in habits are still seen today and are more apparent during the holidays and in spells of good weather.

To accommodate the lack of available social spaces, the council constructed a number of new outdoor public spaces across the county and local businesses also availed of outdoor dining facilities. It is now more common for groups and social gatherings to congregate outdoors and drink coffees or have a take-out meal. The knock-on effect on the bin service is therefore a continuing requirement for more frequent collections on our bins.

Seasonal demands on the bin service require additional staffing resources at critical times in order to keep up with the dynamic pressures on the bins. Therefore, staffing operations are altered to cater for such demands with increased bin collections or litter picking duties in high priority areas.

As in previous years, in 2024 DLR deployed a series of temporary 1100L bins and barrel bins in strategic locations from Easter through to the end of the summer period. These additional temporary bins eased the pressure on the permanent Big Belly bin service and resulted in less littering problems than may have otherwise occurred.

Budget

In recent years, it has become apparent that a build-up in the capital reserve is needed so as to allow for the replacement of the aged fleet of Smart Bins. A significant portion of the existing smart bins are circa 10 years old and beyond their typical service life. In the 2024 budget, a transfer to capital of $\leq 100,000$ was reintroduced and this increased to $\leq 450,000$ in the 2025 budget allocation. Aside from the capital reserve, the remaining operational budget in 2024 remained broadly in line with previous years.

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2024 Initiatives

A summary of the key initiatives undertaken in 2024 to combat demand on the Bin Service are listed below:

- Weekday and weekend bin collection operations were maintained in line with 2024 requirements.
- A new contract for the provision and maintenance of Big Belly Bins was established as a result of tender procedure. The contract provides for a wide range of purchase, rent, lease purchase options, enhanced opportunities for advertising campaigns and improved levels of maintenance and servicing.
- Temporary barrel bins and 1100L wheelie bins were deployed at busy locations during the summer months.
- Enhanced regular maintenance of the areas where Bottle Banks and Clothes Banks are placed.
- Additional General Operatives were deployed in Towns and Villages on a seasonal basis, with weekend hours extended where necessary in times of peak demand.
- Three bin trucks continued to service the street bins countywide.
- Bins were relocated from low usage sites to high usage locations as in previous years.
- Bin collections were heavily monitored with staffing adjusted as required.
- Regular monitoring and trend analysis were undertaken of the Big Belly Clean application statistics to inform the dynamic changes to service demand.
- Additional resource and supports were provided to various public events that took place during the calendar year.

The Litter Management Plan 2023 – 2026

The Litter Management Plan 2023 - 2026 outlines targets and objectives for tackling the problem of litter pollution and sets out to achieve quantifiable improvements in the prevention of litter, with the following objectives:

- Prevent and control litter pollution in the Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council area
- Eliminate litter black spots
- On-going development of our education and awareness programmes in association with schools and communities
- Support any initiatives, new legislation and actions that arise from the recently published Waste Action Plan for a Circular Economy.
- Ensure rigorous enforcement mechanisms of the Act and Bye-Laws are effective.

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Anti-Littering Campaigns 2024

As recommended in the Climate Action Plan 2024-2029, cross departmental campaigns to promote better education regarding anti-littering were ongoing in 2024. An external advertising agency was appointed to relay messages via DLRs bin adverts and other social media channels. Some such cross departmental campaigns included:

- The Anti-litter and dog fouling poster competition was launched in March for Primary Schools. 70No. Big Belly Bins were provided for displaying winning posters in different locations throughout the county.
- The Green-Schools Programme is an environmental education programme run by An Taisce in conjunction with the Local Authorities. A total of 117 schools registered for the Green-Schools programme in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown in 2024 with 30 Green-Schools renewal visits and assessments carried out.
- The Composting and Recycling for Schools Workshops was also delivered to 14 schools
- The Green Dog Walkers campaign was relaunched in late March.
- The Relove Fashion Competition final successfully took place on March 21st in collaboration with the Rediscovery centre and 10 other local authorities.
- The Council continues to support community groups, Residents' Associations, and Tidy District groups in cleaning up local neighbourhoods through the
 - o Community Clean-up Scheme
 - National Spring Clean.
- Promotion of the annual Tidy Districts Awards a total of 33 Residents Associations, Tidy Towns, Tidy Districts and Estate Management groups entered.
- The annual Gum Litter Taskforce Roadshow.
- The Every Can Counts PixelCan installation of marine life was unveiled on East Pier, Dún Laoghaire in June, to coincide with World Ocean Day.
- The Recycled Christmas Decoration Competition which 31 schools entered.
- The No BBQ at the Beach campaign was advertised on Social Media and Local Media.
- Multiple funded workshops and training opportunities for schools in 2024/2025 were promoted widely via email and social media including ReLove Fashion, the Rubbish Film Festival, and Picker Pals.

Previous Smart Bin Review: March 2024

The outcomes of the March 2024 Street Bin review included:

- 1. 122No. requests for additional bins were received in 2023. 39No. requests were approved leading to the installation of bins at 16No. locations and 69No. requests out of the 122No were denied. Many of requests were denied due to unsuitable location for placing and emptying bins. 14No. requests were referred to Parks Department.
- 2. 6No. bins were removed from service during the last review period due to excessive damage or vandalism in most cases damage by fire.
- 3. In order to implement the required installations as per the 2024 report, it was proposed to install 9No. new bins within the County.
- 4. 26No. Big Belly recycling bins were maintained in service.

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Recycling Bins

The Commercial Municipal Waste Characterisation Report of 2022, published by the EPA every 4 years, highlighted that with more people working from home overall commercial waste went down 27,300 tonnes that year. However, this statistic is misleading, as the report later clarifies the majority of the overall waste decrease was due to a decrease in recycling, whereas general waste increased. This should not be interpreted as a reduced demand for recycling bins, as the report also underscores the ongoing challenge of poor segregation of recyclable materials. With 37% of waste found in commercial waste bins being recyclable, it highlights the crucial role the council must play in encouraging the public to recycle properly, in order to achieve our sustainability goals.

Recycling Bins are deployed at strategic areas within the county to give a balanced representation across. DLR Cleansing Section presently maintain 25No. Recycling Bins, please refer to Table 5 for specific locations. The number of Recycling Bins decreased in 2024 - 1 bin was removed from the vandalism risk zone along with the waste one damaged by fire.

Two distinct waste types, plastic bottles and cans, were initially focused on. Other waste streams such as paper and other general forms of plastic were considered, but such materials can often become too highly soiled to be considered as a viable recycling waste material. Big Belly Recycling bins were paired with existing Big Belly general waste bins to provide the public with a recycling option for their plastic bottles and cans.

Since the introduction of Deposit Return Scheme (Re-turn) DLR have been faced with the situation when Re-turn bottles and cans are being placed in Big Belly Bins (waste and recycling) rather than being returned for recycling. To provide the public with an additional option for Re-turn bottles and cans DLR consider trialling the installation of shelves for such waste in collaboration with Re-turn.

It is expected that recycling bins will be used less for plastic bottles and cans. In this regards DLR is not considering installing new recycling bins in 2025 but is instead investigating Return shelves for bins. At the same time the purpose of the recycling bins will be reviewed.

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


Figure 5 (a) – Set of General Waste, Recycling and Pizza bins on Ballymoss Road, Sandyford Industrial Estate




Figure 5 (b): Graphic Representation of 25No. Recycling Bin Locations

Recycling waste streams and collections of plastic bottles and cans have continued in a similar fashion as reported in the last years report. During 2024, a total of 457,702 litres of waste was collected from the Recycling Bins.

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


Figure 5 (c) Volume of Recycling Waste Collected during 2024

Challenges still exist with liquids and other such contaminants being deposited in the Recycling Bins. The EPA reported contamination found on recyclables had increased since last reported in 2018. Continuous education and awareness campaigns are needed to further inform the public on better usage of the Recycling Bins. Locations of the current stock of Recycling Bins are under review presently with a view to moving some of these bins to other more strategic locations so that more widespread information can be gathered. Improved signage of Recycling Bins is also under consideration to provide guidance and prevent contamination.

Composting Smart Bins Trial

DLR is preparing to conduct a composting bin trial on selected streets within the city. This initiative aims to assess the feasibility of providing dedicated public composting facilities to reduce organic waste in general waste streams, promote sustainability, and align with our broader environmental commitments - The Climate Action Plan 2024-2029 Action R16.

While we are enthusiastic about this project's potential environmental and community benefits, significant preparation is required to ensure its successful implementation. Key areas of focus include:

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1. Logistical Planning – Addressing the practical aspects of bin installation, maintenance schedules, waste collection processes, and ensuring proper signage and public information campaigns to support the initiative.

2. Community Engagement – Informing and educating residents and businesses in the trial areas to encourage correct use of the composting bins and foster participation.

3. Monitoring and Evaluation – Establishing clear metrics to evaluate the trial's success, including waste diversion rates, contamination levels, and public feedback.

DLR recognise that the success of this trial depends on careful planning and multi-stakeholder collaboration, and we would greatly value the support of the council in facilitating these efforts.

Damaged Smart Bins

16No. smart bins were damaged in the period March 2024 to February 2025, which are listed in Table 6 below. All but one was fire damaged and all were reported to the An Gardaí Síochána. The damage to these bins was severe enough that they have all been taken out of service.

Two Smart Bins were temporarily removed from service for Halloween in the risk locations on Belarmine Avenue and Village Road to prevent vandalism and for safety reason.

The increase in number of damaged bins from last year prompted the DLR Cleansing Section to input stricter considerations for replacement. It was established only four units required replacing and were strategically relocated to close by areas with more natural surveillance. These measures should deter, and therefore minimise, vandalism to bins in the future.

Collection Frequency January 2024 – December 2024

Collection and maintenance of street bins in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown is carried out by three Cleansing Crews Monday to Sunday. The collection frequency shown below does not truly represent the full increase in effort or work done as the figures only reflect waste collections from within the bin and not contagious to the bin.


Figure 7 (a): Monthly Bin Collections 2023.

Monthly collection data from the 1st of January up until the 31st of December 2024 is presented below in Figure 7b and in the Table 7. Monthly collection data from the same period in 2023 is presented in Figure 7a for comparison.


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


Figure 7 (b): Monthly Bin Collections 2024.





As shown in Figure 7(b), summer periods generally lead to higher bin collection numbers due to an increase in the number of people that now tend to congregate outdoors for social and recreational reasons. Figure 7(c) shows that the overall number of bin collections for 2024 is on a par with the number of collections for 2023. The bin service has grown by 139% since its inception in 2015 and is of immense importance to DLR.





Individual Bin Efficiency

The 'Clean Big Belly Bin' online application gives access to information regarding each individual bin. Using this system, bins with abnormal collection frequency can be identified and examined. These bins then become the focus of attention and thereafter they are examined to ascertain why the collections frequencies are abnormal. In some instances, the extenuating factors causing the abnormal collection rates cannot be mitigated and actions such as removal or relocation may need to be considered.

The following images display the frequency of collections of each bin as an average number of days between collections:




Figure 8: Bins Requiring Emptying Every Single Day

Figure 8 shows the locations of bins requiring emptying every single day with 34No. bins collected every day in 2024. This has decreased from 39No. bins collected at this same frequency in the preceding year, 2023.

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


Figure 9: Bins Requiring Emptying Once Every Two Days.

Figure 9 shows locations of bins requiring emptying every two days. 118No. bins were collected every 2 days in 2024. This has decreased from 121No. bins collected at the same frequency in the preceding year, 2023.

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


Figure 10: Bins Requiring Collection with a Frequency of Between 3 and 7 Days.

Figure 10 shows locations of bins requiring emptying every 3 to 7 days. The data shows that 243No. collections were required on bins every 3 to 7 days which is a decrease from 259No. collections during 2023.

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


Figure 11: Bins Requiring Emptying Every 8 Days or More.

Figure 11 shows bins requiring collection every 8 days or more. The data shows that 46No. bins required collection every 8 days or more which is an increase from 37No. collections during 2023, a 24% increase.

Figures 7, 8, 9 & 10 highlight that the demand for emptying bins has remained in line with the public's requirements in recent years and that the number of bins requiring collection every day or two days remain the same compared to 2022- 2023 figures.

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Operational Issues

As in the previous reports, DLR operatives have continued to observe the disposal of domestic waste related to bin waste. It has been assessed that this is due mainly to domestic and/or commercial waste disposal being illegally deposited in street bins.

Most problems related to domestic waste occurred with bins located in residential areas. Measures have been taken to reduce the ingress of domestic waste, and some successes have been observed but they are generally short lived. Some of the bins have been removed or relocated from residential areas due to excessive abuse by domestic waste.

DLR operatives have experienced ongoing issues with illegal dumping at clothes banks across the county since they were installed. Two clothes banks (at Finsbury Park and

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Stonemason's Way) were removed due to daily abuse of the service. All the locations are monitored systematically by DLR operatives. If additional emptying of the clothes banks is required, the relevant contractor is immediately notified.

Manual Handling Issues

Difficulties related to manual handling and excessive bin weights continue. It is well established that excessive weights in street bins are a direct consequence of the illegal disposal of both domestic and commercial waste.

The level of rubbish from the illegal disposal of domestic waste has increased the weights of bins to over 50kg per bin in some locations.

Cleansing have tendered for a rental agreement with service contract for 3x caged tipper vehicles with mechanical side loaders included (Figure 13) as a replacement for old models with tail-lifts. These vehicles will provide mechanical aid when emptying the Big Belly bins and are ideally sized for the roads within the County. Use of these vehicles increases safety for DLR personnel during loading and unloading operations. The new rental agreement provides a number of benefits for a bin service compared to owned fleet such as quick response to repairs, replacement of the broken vehicle, maintenance.

Bin and waste collections during the busy summer periods has always been a challenge and having a Utility Terrain Vehicle (UTV) in our fleet to enable for ease of access around the county and particularly to our beach locations.




Figure 14: Beach UTV

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Requests for New Bins

Requests are received regularly from members of the public, elected members and residential associations for the installation of additional bins.

If initially approved, a request must still meet with the criteria for suitable installation sites (see appendix A), only then can the installation of a new Smart Bin in the most appropriate place be fully approved. Whilst every effort is made to ensure that the approved locations are suitable sites for the installation of a bin, there is always a possibility that site conditions will force departure from the planned installations.

Proposed Installation of New Smart Bins in Response to Requests

The 2024 review period was another busy year with requests for new bins. 70No. requests for new bins and 41No. for replacements (111No. in total) were logged over the period from February 2024 up to end of February 2025. Some of these requests repeated the previous review. Since installations for these bins were approved, they were not considered again. Every request received an initial response stating that the outcome of their request would only be made known upon publication of the bin review. Non-specific requests i.e. 'multiple bins over large areas' can't be fully detailed in this report. If one location, in a non-specific request is granted then the outcome as measured against the full request is deemed as a single approval. Requesting bodies and their agents should strive to make each request as specific as possible. Following extensive research and consideration of each request, 20No. Requests were granted out of the 111No. requests.

New bin installations must take into account the criteria given in Appendix A. New installations or replacements need to be considered against the number of bins available for relocation, the purchase cost of additional bins, and the need to prioritise new bins for deployment in the urban streetscape. Following our review, it is proposed to place 8No. new Smart Bins in the locations listed below in Appendix C. These 8No. installations will satisfy the approved requests. 74No. requests have been denied and listed in Appendix D. The 17No. requests forwarded to Parks sections.

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Summary of the March 2024 DLR Street Bin Review

- 1. 111No. requests for additional bins and replacements were received since the last review.
- 2. 16No. bins were removed from service since the last review due to excessive damage or vandalism. It is proposed to replace some of these bins. See Table 3 for a list of damaged units.
- 3. In order to implement the required installations as per this report, it is proposed to install 8No. new Big Belly solar bins within the county as listed in Appendix C.
- 4. 25No. Big Belly recycling bins installed throughout the County.
- 5. Of the 111No. new requests for bin installation received, 20No. requests have been approved leading to the proposed installation or relocation of bins at 13No. locations. 74No. requests out of the 111No. requests have been denied.
- 6. Cleansing will continue to monitor bin performance and remain reactive to the dynamic changes that may arise throughout 2025.
- 7. It should be noted that circa 300No. (67%) of the existing fleet of Big Belly Bins were installed in 2015 and as such they are aged and reaching the end of their service life. Replacement of these bins will be an important element to consider in 2025-2027 rather than expansion of the existing stock of bins on the streetscape. Cleansing have started an inspection of an existing fleet of Big Belly Bins to prepare a Programme for gradual replacement of the fleet. 52No. old bins from all electoral areas were selected for replacement in 2025. The criteria for priority replacement are high footfall locations in towns and villages considering motor fatigue and excessive internal and external damage and severe weather conditions in coastal areas.

Requests for New Bins / Amendments

Members of the public or elected members can submit requests in relation to street bins. Requests can range from the removal of street bins to the installation of new bins. All requests should be concise and specific in relation to the proposed individual locations and be logged through the councils Civic Hub email address: info@dlrcoco.ie. The cut off point for receiving new requests is the 28th of February thus allowing such requests to be reviewed and included in the annual Bin Review. Subsequent requests will be considered as part of a next annual bin review.

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Appendix A: Criteria for the Placement of Street Bins

The Cleansing Section receives requests for new bins regularly. These requests are considered at each bin review with evaluation given to the following factors.

Favorable factors for placing bins are:

- Near schools and other educational institutions.
- At bus stops with sufficient footfall.
- In the vicinity of town centers, transport routes, parks and recreation areas, shopping areas with high footfall.
- Additional bins are required in areas considered to be litter black spots.
- Accessibility for the public.
- Sufficient place to accommodate a bin, wheelchair users, and pedestrians.
- Safe system of work whether there is a safe place for Council vehicle and operators to park/load and service the bins.

Unfavorable factors for placing bins are:

- Insufficient footfall in locations where bins can be under-used.
- Unsafe place for Council vehicle and operators to park/load and service the bins.
- Risk of vandalism at certain locations.
- Risk of disposal of domestic waste in particular locations such as residential areas.
- Sufficient number of bins available around the area.
- Area is not taken in charge by DLRCC.

It is generally found that a large proportion of requests for new bins are proposed in locations within or around housing estates, areas where there is a high risk of vandalism or in locations where it is not safe from a traffic management perspective regarding maintenance of bins.

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Appendix B: Bin Service in Parks

Across the County, departmental jurisdictions dictate that specific areas of control fall under the remit of different individual sections. As such, the Cleansing section are responsible for the provision and maintenance of bins within all public areas, other than parks, with some minor exceptions. Both Cleansing and Parks have strict criteria which are used to assess the suitability of individual bin placements.

It is identifiable that Cleansing maintain a large portion of their current bin stock at locations that are placed near to parks and park entrances. Such bin-placements are only considered viable if they satisfy cleansing's strict installation criteria. The Cleansing section maintains smart bins within the streetscape along with some 14 metal coastal bins and 13 dog waste bins.

Bins are generally only provided within parks which maintain a complement of staff. Bins within Marlay Park, Cabinteely Park and other flagship parks throughout the county are maintained by the Parks Department staff. Reports in relation to these bins within parks should be addressed to the Parks Department. It should be noted that the Parks Department do not provide bins in local amenity neighborhood parks.

The 17 new bin requests were forwarded to Parks sections. Please see Appendix E.
