Councillors in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council recently adopted a new Corporate Plan for 2020-2024. The Plan was developed following extensive consultation in 2019 with the public, community groups, local citizen interest organisations, business groups, Council staff, Councillors and other stakeholders. The aim was to gather as wide a view as possible on what aspirations people had for their County.

Following this consultation period, the Corporate Plan was drafted and developed, taking on board existing council plans, public consultation views and relevant legislation. The Plan is much more than just another Council document; it provides a strategic framework for the Councils vision for the County, it's goals for the next five years and the core values which will guide the Councils work over the lifetime of the Plan.

### The Vision for the County is **"A progressive and vibrant County that is attractive, inclusive and accessible."**

The following themes emerged as priorities over the course of the consultation period informing the specific Corporate Goals of the Council.

- Enriching quality of life through vibrant communities, housing and amenities
- A leader in environmental protection and climate action
- Embracing change and delivering excellent public service
- Supporting and fostering a resilient local economy

The eight specific Corporate Goals that the Council has adopted are aimed at enhancing quality of life and maximising opportunity in the County and we will achieve these corporate goals by working and collaborating effectively in tandem with our vision for the County.

#### CORPORATE GOALS

- **1.** Showing leadership in protecting the environment through education and in how we work.
- 2. Facilitate the development of a variety of housing options enabling improved choice, that drives quality of life for all.
- 3. Enhance people's lives through access to sustainable travel choices across our network of communities.
- 4. Provide quality community, recreational, sporting and cultural opportunities for all who live, work and visit the County.
- 5. Enhance the vitality of our town and villages while preserving our natural and built heritage.
- 6. Engage with businesses to support their presence and growth in the County.
- 7. Promote equality and human rights by implementing the Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty.
- 8. Optimise human, financial and physical resources to deliver accessible customer focused quality services.

# **County Development Plan** 2022-2028



We would like to thank all the individuals and groups who have made submissions as part of the pre-draft consultation phase held in January and February. Many thanks also to everyone who visited us at our open days held throughout the County.

Your next opportunity for public involvement in the Plan making process will be in late 2020 and early 2021 when you as members of the public will have a chance to make a submission on the draft Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Development Plan. We have embarked on the process of reviewing the current Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Development Plan 2016-2022, and preparing a new County Development Plan (CDP) that will shape the future growth of the County for the period of 2022 – 2028.

The Development Plan is part of hierarchy of spatial plans and the County Development Plan must be consistent with the higher level Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy (RSES) for the Eastern and Midland Region and also with the National Planning Framework (NPF).

The County Development Plan review began on 3rd January 2020 and the process, which must be followed in the making of a new County Development Plan, will take almost two years culminating in the adoption of a new County Development Plan late in 2021, with the Plan coming into force early 2022. The Plan kicked off with an 8-week public consultation phase which included 6 open days being held across the County. Staff from the Development plan team were available to answer any queries and to advise on how to make a submission during that 8-week period which ended on 28 February 2020.

A "Have your say" document was prepared and whilst the initial pre-draft period for making a submission is now closed, the document, which is available at ww.dlrcoco.ie provides a good overview of both the Development Plan process and what has been happening in the County since the adoption of the last plan back in 2016.

#### What do you do?

I have worked for dlrcc for 19 years and I currently work in the Planning Section. Previous to this I worked in Housing as well as Culture, Community Development and Amenities. I started my career in the public service with Dublin Corporation, working in the Motor Tax section.

#### What is your typical work day like?

My role is varied as I am currently working across multiple projects such as administrative support for the County Development Plan Team as they prepare a new County Development Plan for 2022-2028. I am involved in a major planning transformation project within the Planning Department which will involve upgrading the APAS planning application system and implementing a new online document management system. This will enable us to modernise the way we work into the future and prepare the way for E-Planning so that ultimately customers will be able to make planning applications on-line.

#### What is the most difficult part of your job?

I am working across multiple projects so it is always a balancing act in order to manage them all!

#### What is the most rewarding part of your job?

It is an exciting time for us and our citizens as we are in the early stages of developing the new County Development Plan for 2022-2028. This process is a collaborative one and takes over two years to complete. We are looking forward to meeting and talking to our citizens about their views and how collectively we can shape the future of our County. There has been considerable growth and change in the County since the adoption of the Development Plan 2016-2022 and we will continue to build on that over the lifetime of the next plan.

Any school wishing to apply for a new flag in 2020, are invited to contact the Council to arrange this visit before Friday, 27 March 2020.


The Green-Schools programme is facilitated locally by dlr County Council staff, in conjunction with An Taisce. Currently, dlr has 112 schools registered with the programme. The programme is designed to promote and acknowledge whole school action for the environment. Schools undertake long term projects on environmental issues such as waste and litter management, energy, water, sustainable transport, biodiversity and global citizenship.

# **Green Dog Walkers** Take the Pledge

The Green Dog Walkers (GDW) scheme is a nonconfrontational and friendly initiative to prevent dog fouling. Local residents are invited to help get the message out that dog foul litter is socially unacceptable. The scheme asks dog owners to make the following pledge to clean up after their dog, carry extra dog waste bags and be happy to be approached to 'lend' a dog waste bag to those without.

Anyone can take the pledge to be a Green Dog Walker by

signing the Green Dog Walkers Form and returning it to the Council. Once registered, you will receive a complimentary 'doggie bone' bag dispenser, a roll of bags and information leaflet. # Showcasing dlr Entreprenuers



Daniel Nugent and Sacha Cahill

Ambr Eyewear was co-founded by Daniel Nugent and Sacha Cahill. Set up in 2017 and based in Dún Laoghaire, Ambr Eyewear provides fashionable well-designed 'blue light blocking' glasses for use with screens.

Due to their jobs in technology the founders spent significant time working on screens which was resulting in eye-strain and poor sleep quality. When they researched the causes and possible solutions they found that there was very little on the market so they decided to design their own.

Over the last two years, the business has grown significantly with the brand selling glasses to almost 80 countries through its website ambreyewear.com. They have also secured listings with Brown Thomas, Retail in Motion and had a very successful Christmas pop-up store on Wicklow Street.

Throughout this period Ambr EyeWear consistently engaged with the Dún-Laoghaire Rathdown Local Enterprise Office receiving support in a number of ways. **They received assistance** with funding for salary support as well as support to attend International Trade Fairs. which enabled them to support their brand internationally. When they needed to upgrade their website they used funding available through the Local Enterprise Office's Trading Online Voucher scheme.

Daniel applied to Ireland's Best Young Entrepreneur 2019 competition and won the County's Best Business Start up Category and the business was also the Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County winner in the National Enterprise Awards 2019. The prizes from both competitions provided further investment in the business.

# Daniel said *"we were delighted with the support we received from our Local Enterprise Office and would recommend any new start-up to check them out".*

Going forward, the couple hope to expand its online business throughout Europe with German, Spanish and French websites. They've also secured a deal with a Dubai-based distributor.

It's been quick growth for this exciting local start-up, and they are definitely one to watch for the future.

# Pop Up Shop Profile



The staff of the Economic Development Unit supports and fosters economic growth by engaging with businesses from all sectors to support their presence across the county.

As part of this remit, the Unit operates a pop-up shop in Dún Laoghaire Shopping Centre which is available to local artists and craftspeople to rent on a weekly basis. With its high profile location facing out onto George's Street Upper, the shop is always in high demand and is currently almost booked out for 2020.

Over the last two years, the shop has given over fifty artisans the opportunity to showcase their products in a commercial retail setting.

One of the Pop-Up Shop's recent tenants, Mary Van Son, spoke to us about her experience.

"As a small business owner, there's no other way that I would be able to access such a high profile location. The pop-up shop is a brilliant way for people to showcase their work. It has allowed me to build up a whole new customer network. I've got to know lots of the other occupants of the shop. This week for instance I was running low on stock, so the next person in was able to drop some of her goods in this week and they're on show – I've built up some great relationships with other sellers. One of the best things about the shop is how excited people are about who's going to be the next person in. There are people who will pop in every week, and there's a lovely social element to it. People drop in for a chat and there's a sense of community about the shop."

# dlr Grants 2020


Each year the Council operates its dlr Grants Scheme. The Scheme is designed to provide financial support and assistance to local based initiatives that promote community development and social inclusion. It also enables growth and development of local sports, arts and environmental organisations as well as developing collaborative local enterprise with business area promotion grants. The diversity of these grants is a vital funding stream for a broad spectrum of local groups and since 2014 the Council has awarded almost €4 million through the dlr Grants Scheme.

The Scheme for 2020 was adopted by Councillors at the December Council meeting and provided for a total of  $\in$ 380,481, co-funding 272 projects and initiatives all across the county. This funding is assisting grassroots groups to enhance their local areas in a wide variety of ways, whether its undertaking community or environmental project work, providing sports equipment or supporting a local arts collective, enabling citizens to engage positively in the community.

Grants are available twice a year with Round 2 of the 2020 Scheme grants commencing now, opening for applications to our online portal from 6 March to 3 April. Grants Scheme information meetings will take place across the county and will be advertised in local newspapers, the Public Participation Network as well as the Council website and its social media channels.

# Dún Laoghaire Harbour to welcome 22 Cruise Ships

Dún Laoghaire Harbour prepares for a bumper year of cruise ships and overseas visitors this summer. The port is preparing to welcome its largest contingent to date with 22 cruise ships and over 40,000 passengers and crew. These ships will bring a welcome revenue of over €300,000 in berthing fees to the local authority. In order to improve the visitor experience dlr have moved the landing point for guests to a more central point in the harbour at the Carlisle Pier. The town and hinterlands will see an increase of visitor numbers as guests now arriving in the harbour will immediately see the town from their arrival point and local ambassadors will be on hand to welcome and guide guests.

The summer kicks off in May with the first of five calls from one of the largest cruise operators in the world, Norwegian Cruise Lines (NCL). Norwegian Star will make her first visit to Dún Laoghaire, and will have 4,000 passengers and crew. The summer of 2021 will see almost double the number of ships and visitors with 38 calls and over 90,000 passengers and crew. The local authority will see a boost in revenue of over €800,000.

Harbour operations will be running on full capacity to manage the influx of calls to the harbour and will welcome the trial run in advance of a busier year in 2021.



As Deansgrange Cemetery reaches capacity for burials dlr are pleased to announce the completion of its first Columbarium Walls. Niches are now available for purchase from the Cemetery Office in Deansgrange.

A columbarium wall contains 180 niches of which each is capable of holding two bespoke medium-sized caskets of cremated remains. These caskets are provided by the Cemetery Office to the family or Funeral Director on booking.


