CREATING AN ENVIRONMENT FOR ECONOMIC GROWTH

Plans and Policies

1. Local Economic & Community Plan (LECP)

Work is underway to progress the implementation of the Local Economic and Community Plan www.dlrcoco.ie. This key statutory plan to support and promote economic growth and enhance the quality of life and well-being of our communities in Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown. A progress report will be reported to Council at the end of the year on achievements since the plan was adopted and launched in April 2016.

2. Tourism

A Tourism Working Group has been established to support the development of a Tourism Strategy & Marketing Plan for Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown. Failte Ireland are also involved in the working group and recently attended the Economic Development and Enterprise SPC to inform members about the latest marketing campaign for 'Dublin – A Breath of Fresh Air' which is aimed at increasing visitor numbers principally from at the GB market.

Active Land Management

The primary 'performance' indicator available to actively assess the issue of housing supply is the Dublin Housing Supply Coordination Taskforce (DHSCT) data - of which DLR contributes on a quarterly basis. The data utilised within the Household Taskforce is focused to capturing developments with planning permission for 10 or more units across the Dublin Region.

The most significant performance indicators - within DLR- are based on growth rates between Q2 2015 and Q2 2016. This includes:

- 19% increase on the number of sites with planning permission from 62 sites to 74 sites.
- **19%** increase in the **total number of units** with planning permission from 5,596 to 6,754 units
- 30% increase in active sites from 29 sites to 38 sites.
- 70% increase in the number of units under construction from 1,104 to 1,881.
- **673** completions over **first 8 months** of 2016 which is **above** completion rate for **the entire 12 months in 2015** of 651 units.

The most salient and positive performance indicators are based on DLR providing:

- 19% of units with planning permission within the Dublin Region.
- 30% of Active Sites within the Dublin Region.
- 39% of units under construction within the Dublin Region.
- 20% of all units currently being processed within planning system the Dublin Region.
- 26% of all housing completions across the Dublin Region (first 8 months 2016)

Plans and Policies

Arts Policy Consultation

A final draft of the Arts Development Plan 2016 – 2022 was recommended for approval at the Community Development, Culture and Ageing Strategic Policy Committee Meeting in September 2016. The draft plan will now go to Council for consideration.

Capital Projects

1. Cabinteely library

Works are substantially complete; snagging is now being done

2. Blackglen Road/Harold's Grange Road Improvement Scheme

The Part 8 for this scheme was approved on the 13th June 2016 by the Elected Members. Negotiations were finalised with RPS Consultants on a brief to prepare a detailed design, CPO drawings, Oral Hearing process (likely to be required by An Bord Pleanala), tender documents and supervision of the construction contract. These works begun in September 2016.

3. Foxrock Village Car Park

Tenders went out and have been returned, a contractor has been selected to undertake the works. Waiting the signing and appointment of successful contractor, expect to commence on site early October 2016.

4. Corbawn Lane - Beach Access

Following agreement of Part 8 in March 2016, the scheme is cleared through other statutory processes.

5. Glenalbyn Pool

A report on the proposals for a swimming pool in Stillorgan was circulated as part of the meeting pack for consideration by the Council at it's September meeting but the item was not reached on the night of the meeting . It is listed for discussion at this Council meeting under Chief Executive's Business .

10 <u>Cherrywood SDZ – Progress Report.</u>

The current Main Work Streams to realise the delivery of the Cherrywood SDZ include:

- Druid's Glen Road- Part 8 being advanced by dlr Road Projects;
- The Part 8 design preparation for the Bride's Glen to Shankill scheme being advanced by dlr Road Projects;
- The commencement of design scoping for the supporting greenway infrastructure with the SDZ area:
- Funding options for the delivery of the Infrastructure to support the SDZ;
- Town Centre the Urban Form Development Framework (UFDF) The DA's preparation of the Plan is well underway in collaboration with the relevant landowners (ref page 67 of the Cherrywood Planning Scheme). It should be noted that the preparation of the UFDF is a pre requisite to the approval of any planning applications for the Town Centre;
- The preparation of an Open Space Guidance Document; and
- Surface Water Attenuation Strategy review.

Stakeholder Engagement

The delivery of the Scheme is complex requiring a number of stakeholders to engage and dlr as Development Agency is actively promoting the implementation of the objectives of the approved Planning Scheme through collaboration and engagement with all relevant stakeholders.

With Government's focus on the housing crisis the Department of Housing, Planning and Local Government has taken specific interest in progressing the Cherrywood Planning Scheme. Meetings with all key stakeholders are ongoing.

Hines Real Estate Ireland (REI) has built a 3 - D timber scaled model of the entire Cherrywood SDZ area. In addition to this, Hines REI has installed a show apartment in the Cherrywood Marketing suite reflecting an example of an apartment built under the new design standards for apartments. The DA will be leading in arranging sessions with the elected members in due course to facilitate viewing both the model, which provides a comprehensive overview of the entire development and associated infrastructure provision and the show apartment.

Funding

It is acknowledged that a suite of infrastructure and services are required for the full development of the Planning scheme. As a Planning Scheme, infrastructural facilities and services that benefit the development can be funded by way of a supplementary levy scheme under Section 49 and /or an additional Section 48 levy scheme and /or a supplementary Section 48(2) (c) levy scheme as facilitated by the Planning and Development Acts 2000 – 2010 as amended. At the 14th December 2015 Council meeting, the Council provided for this to be progressed as part of the adoption of the Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council Development Contribution Scheme 2016 – 2020.

It is critical that a robust funding stream is established to ensure that infrastructure can be realised. Extensive progress has been made in relation to the funding mechanism required for the delivery of Cherrywood common infrastructure, to include a Cherrywood Section 48 Development Levy Scheme.

The common infrastructure elements include for a road network in the order of 10km, storm water infrastructure in the order of 3.8ha and the delivery of 29.7ha of open space – class 1. An informed cost estimate for the delivery of the common infrastructure will be in excess of earrow130,000,000 for construction alone. Discussions are ongoing with the Government's Housing Project Delivery Office and the DHP&LG is the assessment of options to fund the required funding in addition to a proposed Cherrywood Section 48 Development Levy Contribution Scheme. These discussions will inform the Cherrywood Section 48 Development Contributions Scheme to be brought to the Members. It is envisaged that these discussions will conclude in the coming weeks to allow a draft Scheme to be brought to Council as soon thereafter.

It is also the intention to target the Local Infrastructure Housing Activation Fund (LIHAF) to part fund infrastructure in Cherrywood and the DA is currently engaging with all the landowners to discuss funding proposals and in preparing a bid under this fund. Submissions in this regard must be with the DHP&LG by 14th October 2016.

Scheme Amendments

The Planning and Development (Amendment) Act 2015

https://www.oireachtas.ie/documents/bills28/acts/2015/a6315.pdf as recently published provides for streamlining the process for the making of modifications to SDZ planning schemes. The new legislation provides for a new procedure in making an application to An Bord Pleanáa.

The DA has advanced the preparation of a number of amendments to include for the application of the new Apartment Guidelines 2015

http://www.environ.ie/sites/default/files/publications/files/apartment guidelines 21122015.pdf. Four amendments have been prepared that relate directly to the above apartment guidelines legislation in terms of addressing/clarifying apartment development within the SDZ to ensure consistency with Government policy. A further fifth amendment relates to the development of the Town Centre (retail element). In the preparation of the Urban Form Development Framework (UFDF) the form of the construction project for the Town Centre is crystalling for reasons to do with construction, cost and layout. This requires amendment to the sequencing of development within the Town Centre. It is envisaged that further amendments will be considered and drafted by the DA in the coming months.

11. Brennanstown Road Traffic Management Scheme.

The scheme went out on Part 8 Public Consultation on 19th August 2016. The closing date for submissions was 14th October 2016.

Additional Part 8 units will be advanced together with working with Approved Housing Bodies regarding delivery of units. The provision of Rapid Build Units are also been considered.

Progress has been made with the Housing Agency to progress the delivery of 155 units at Enniskerry Road.

Proposed Schemes

- Georges Street, Park House 4 units
- Rapid delivery of approx. 28 units at Churchtown, Hazelbrook.
- Rapid Build delivery of approx. 10-14 units at Glenamuck, Rockville Drive,
- Shanganagh Castle Site- This is capable of delivering over 500 units of accommodation. Discussions are taking place with the Housing Delivery Office as to the best use of the site in terms of mixed tenure and progressing the infrastructure deficit.

Part V Social and Affordable: Acquisition Programme

Part V Agreements Reached Jan - September 2016:

A total of 10 agreements were made in accordance with Part V of the Planning & Development Act 2000, as amended and the Urban Regeneration and Housing Act 2015 which will result in the delivery of 138 social housing units.

An additional 8 units, under an Agreement made in 2015, are due for delivery this year.

Discussions/negotiations are taking place with 22 other developers in relation to compliance with Part V and these have the potential to deliver up to 114 units of accommodation.

Acquisitions Jan - September 2016

A total of 14 units have been acquired and agreements have been reached to purchase an additional 30 units.

A new key worker from the Focus Ireland Housing Action Team (HAT) began working with the Homeless Section in June 2016. They will work exclusively with the homeless families placed in Blackrock House and Trafalgar Terrace.

Grant Assistance to the Elderly and Disabled

Notification of the 2016 Allocation for Housing Adaptation Grants for Older People and People with a Disability was received from the Department of the Environment on 5^{th} February 2016. An allocation of 1,342,645 has been made to this Council of which 268,529 (20%) to be funded from the Council's own non LPT revenue resources and 1,074,116 from exchequer funding. A portion of the exchequer funded element will be provided from the County Council's Local Property Tax Revenue for 2016 in lieu of exchequer funds.

Observations or comments must be made directly in writing to the Office of Public Works (OPW) or via the email address draftplans@opw.ie.

In accordance with Sections 18(2) and (3) of Statutory Instrument S.I. No. 122 of 2010 (European Communities (Assessment and Management of Flood Risks) Regulations 2010, as amended by S.I. No. 495 of 2015 (European Communities (Assessment and Management of Flood Risks) (Amendment) Regulations 2015, Local Authorities may make submissions up to Monday 19th December 2016. Any such submission is a reserved function of the Council.

Following the public consultation process, the draft Plans will be finalised taking on board the comments received and will then be sent to the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform for approval. If approved, they will then be sent to the Local Authorities who may adopt them. A national prioritised list of flood risk management measures has not been developed as this can only be finalised when comments submitted during the consultation process have been taken account of.

10. Environmental Monitoring

The former Bray Municipal Landfill at North Beach, Bray is located largely within the county boundary of Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council and has been the subject to on-going erosion by winter storms at sea over a prolonged period.

At the end of January 2016 the Environmental Protection Agency, under Section 63(3)(a) of the EPA Acts 1992 and 2003, issued the following advice and recommendations to Dun Laoghaire Rathdown Council:

- 1. DLRCC is required to carry out or cause to be carried out, an Environmental Risk Assessment, including site investigations of the site Bray Landfill, Bray
- 2. The Risk Assessment should be carried out in accordance with the EPA's "Code of Practice: Environmental Risk Assessment for Unregulated Waste Disposal Sites" (April 2007) and should be used to identify remediation options and develop a remediation plan for the site.
 - The Agency considers achievement of these requirements to be necessary to the satisfactory performance by your Council of its statutory environmental protection functions in this matter.

On foot of this instruction proposals were sought by Dun Laoghaire Rathdown Council from qualified consultants and Fehily Timoney & Company were appointed to carry out the necessary work. The Council is currently working with Fehily Timoney & Company to complete a technical report which will identify if the former landfill does pose a threat to the environment and if so, to identify what works might need to be undertaken. The Council is continuing to liaise with the EPA on this matter. The Council in partnership with Wicklow County Council carried out a clean-up of the beach area earlier this year following the storms.

Discussions are ongoing between the Council and Irish Water to ensure this transition takes place with minimum inconvenience for the Customers involved and to also ensure any administrative supports required by Irish Water from the Council during this period are in place.
