# JULY MONTHLY MANAGEMENT REPORT

# 25 June - 31 July 2021





While there was further easing of restrictions during June, they did not impact on many of our services, with the exception of gyms and swimming pools reopening for individual training. Numbers permitted at outdoor organised events also increased.

As the public health advice continued to recommend that staff continue to work from home were possible. Staff continued to work remotely were possible while access to County Hall by members of the public is by appointment only, for urgent business.

Updates on services affected, by department are detailed below:

#### Libraries


All dlr Library spaces re-opened to the public on Monday 10 May, as part of a gradual, responsible resumption of onsite library services in line with <u>Government guidelines</u>. Services available during this phase include:

Return and borrowing of items, quick browse visits with restricted numbers in place and a return to usual staffed opening hours with late evenings and Saturday opening. Printing from home, from a personal device, or from a designated quick-use PC and use of self-service photocopiers is permitted while use of Surfbox <u>postal printing service</u>, for next day delivery, and the availability of all our online services continues. The national reserves system remains operational during this phase as does the national delivery service for inter-county reservations.

However, as per Government guidelines for this phase, we are unable at present to provide any service which involves seating, including access to general seating or study spaces. We are unable at this time to provide full access to Internet PCs/laptops, or to programme live indoor events in our spaces. During this phase, numbers permitted at organised outdoor events = 200 attendees.

#### **Book Drop Service**

Since the re-opening of library spaces, and the continuing roll-out of the national vaccination programme, the number of calls to the Book Drop Service has continued to decline. Over **1,900** calls have been received since April 2020, with over **11,600** books delivered to the elderly and most vulnerable members or our community. Book deliveries, where still required, are made by the dlr Library driver





The Community response to Covid-19 is being led and coordinated by **Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council** in collaboration with a wide-range of stakeholders in the Community Response Forum, supported by a wide range of community and volunteer groups.

Community Response to COVID-19:

- Helpline and email address set up and promoted across all communication channels
- Operates 7 days a week from 9 am to 5 pm
- The Community Call Helpline has dealt with 4,479 calls since it commenced on 30 March 2020 and issues range from shopping, pension, medical, loneliness and isolation
- 18 calls were received in July. The majority of the calls relate to requests in relation to the HSE vaccination programme.
- The Community Response Forum is meeting every two months at present to support in coordinating the provision of a multi-agency response to the individuals in the community that are negatively impacted arising from the measures implemented by the Government to stem the spread of Covid 19.

#### Health & Wellbeing Initiatives:

Against the background of the Covid Restrictions, it was necessary to develop a range of initiatives to support health and wellbeing in our communities. The priority was to encourage communities to keep fit and active, stay connected and support them in looking after their mental health. Initiatives were rolled out across Libraries, Sports and Physical Fitness, Arts, Heritage and Biodiversity. The Council also partnered with Making Connections, that primarily looks after the elderly, in delivering a range of individual initiatives, in the community to help isolated individuals to connect with their neighbours.

#### Keep Well Campaign 2021

The Keep Well campaign is a national campaign which the government is promoting to help people stay well through the winter months. The Campaign is focused on 5 themes: Staying Connected, Switching Off and Being Creative, Managing your Mood, Keeping Active and Eating Well.

The promotion of the Keep Well Campaign in DLR continues. The 5 themes of the campaign are being promoted on social media. Each week focuses on a different theme with initiatives from the respective theme promoted.

#### Heritage

Roll out of Covid-safe outdoor Summer of Heritage 2021 programme of free guided outdoor and indoor heritage tours. Two new outdoor tours added – George's St. Past, Present, Future and Dún Laoghaire Street Art Tour.

#### **Municipal Services**

All sections are working closely with the Gardaí to assist in social distancing in public areas, including parks, open spaces, beaches, harbours and piers.

<u>Water Services:</u> all essential services continue to be provided, including water supply, drainage services including surface water management and flood management. All essential repairs, operational and maintenance works are continuing, routine and other works have resumed.



<u>Road maintenance</u>: the level of activity is at normal service with the majority of outdoor staff in operation. Essential operations including emergency repairs and upkeep, winter maintenance, responses to Gardaí and traffic accidents continue to be dealt with, and Road Resurfacing & Footpath upgrade programmes are in progress.

The Roads Control continues to grant and manage road opening licenses and permits for essential utility services, including electricity, water, gas and telecommunications as part of the Council's essential services operations implemented as part of COVID-19 restrictions introduced on Friday 8<sup>th</sup> January 2021.

<u>Cleansing/Street cleaning:</u> all Service are resumed, including litter removal, street sweeping/cleansing and litter bin emptying. Level of activity has increased with all outdoor staff back in operation.

<u>Traffic:</u> During the Covid 19 pandemic, the Council carried out several interventions <u>to</u> improve facilities for pedestrians and cyclists. This included the provision of cycle lane protection at several junctions and routes and the provision of wider footpaths using bollards and cones to facilitate physical distancing in towns and villages. In addition, village improvement schemes were carried out at Blackrock, Dundrum, Glasthule and Dalkey. A number of these schemes ran over into Q2 2021 and a total of  $\in$ 5.6m was spent on these projects up to 2020-year end.

In July, as part of a Stimulus package, the Government announced total package of just over  $\in 100m$  to support sustainable mobility. As part of this, about  $\in 9.0$  million was allocated to Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council for 65 schemes. This funding was used for such interventions as cycle lane protection schemes, improved footpaths and road surfaces, and improved cycle links though parks.

Beaches/Harbours/Piers: All services have resumed.

#### Local Enterprise Office and Economic Development Unit

The Local Enterprise Office continues to offer grant and training supports to businesses impacted by Covid 19. A webpage has been setup for the specialised <u>LEO Covid supports</u> which contains details of all the government supports for businesses in these difficult times.

The Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment launched the <u>Small Business Assistance</u> <u>Scheme for COVID</u> (SBASC) in March. The scheme targeted those businesses with operating costs that do not qualify for the COVID Restrictions Support Scheme (CRSS) operated by the Revenue Commissioners. Closing date for applications under this phase of the Scheme was April 21<sup>st</sup> 2021 and a total of 147 applications were received. This Scheme has now been extended to to include businesses operating from a non-rateable premises like a home business or yard.

In addition to helping companies adopt best practices in dealing with crisis, the Local Enterprise Office (LEO) is continuing to provide a full range of training supports, details of which are available <u>here</u>.

The Fáilte Ireland <u>Outdoor Dining Scheme</u> which was introduced in April 2021 provides funding to individual businesses to introduce or expand their outdoor seating. The Scheme is open for applications until September 30 2021, and replaces the Street Furniture Grant which had been introduced by the Council last year. To date over €100,000 has been provided to support dlr businesses in the hospitality sector.



The coming months will see the roll-out of a major initiative involving lighting up significant buildings. This is made possible by "Destination Towns" funding from Fáilte Ireland.

The Economic Development Unit has been involved in a number of significant initiatives aimed at increasing footfall in the county's towns and villages, including the Dún Laoghaire Anseo street art programme and the Summer Streets initiative.

#### Infrastructure and Climate Change:

The Directorate is continuing its work on the following CoVid19 interventions and Active travel programme.

- The Directorate continues to respond to environmental, waste and litter pollution incidents, as needed, and such incidents are recorded and managed as usual through the Civic Hub and the CRM system.
- The Council's waste recycling facilities remain open (at Ballyogan, Eden Park and Shanganagh) with social distancing and other HSE recommended protocols in place and the Council-operated Bring Banks continue to be serviced and made available for use by the public. Activity at these sites during Covid 19 has increased compared to the same months last year.
- Property Management continues to offer a full service.
- The Capital Projects Team continue to progress capital projects through design stages. Some delays are encountered with Covid restrictions on the construction sectors and associated services.

#### **Forward Planning Infrastructure**

- The Directorate continue to engage with applicants, their representatives and other state agencies as part of on-line systems to include tele / video conferencing to facilitate workshops and reporting in the assessment of the Cherrywood Planning Scheme.
- Work continues in progressing the project designs and tender documentation of the Cherrywood Urban Regeneration Development Fund (URFD) - Parks, Greenways and Attenuation project, as well as the Cherrywood LIHAF project for the Druid's Glen Road.

#### Architectural Services

All areas fully operational.

#### Housing

 The Housing Department, as an essential service, continues to operate although with some additional health and safety restrictions, due to Covid-19. Housing services including Homeless, Allocations, HAP and essential Housing Maintenance works are being progressed with additional supports provided as required to the vulnerable including the Traveller Community. Given the limited access to homes, some services such as standards inspections and minor maintenance calls continue to be suspended. Part V negotiations have continued and applications for Housing Adaptation Grants for Older Persons and People with a Disability continue to be processed.



• Staff continue to engage with home loan borrowers and tenants who have been affected by a loss of or reduced income as a result of the pandemic.

#### Finance

<u>Rates:</u> The Government announced on the 1st June that the commercial rates waiver put in place for the first half of 2021 will be extended to the end of September. It applies to eligible businesses as they adjust to the reopening of the economy and recover from a period of lower commercial activity. Businesses currently eligible for the waiver will continue to be eligible for the waiver for quarter three.

As has been the case with the 2021 waiver to date, the waiver will be applied automatically to eligible customers' accounts.

The Council continues to work in partnership with businesses who are experiencing difficulty paying their rates. Payment plans are entered into which are mutually acceptable to the business and the Council.

<u>Phase 2 - Small Business Assistance Scheme for Covid – SBASC:</u> The expanded Small Business Assistance Scheme for COVID opened for applications on the 10<sup>th</sup> June through the Council's website. The closing date for this scheme is 21st July 2021.

Phase 2 of this scheme has been expanded to include those that had previously been ineligible. Businesses working from non-rateable premises are now eligible to apply and if they meet the other eligibility criteria will receive a grant of  $\notin$ 4,000.

Businesses with a turnover between  $\leq 20,000$  and  $\leq 49,999$  are also now eligible to apply if they meet the other eligibility criteria and will receive a grant of  $\leq 1,000$ . SBASC gives grants to businesses who are not eligible for the Government's COVID Restrictions Support Scheme (CRSS), the Fáilte Ireland Business Continuity grant or other direct sectoral grant schemes. This scheme aims to help businesses with their fixed costs, for example, rent, utility bills, security. Business who have received Phase 1 of SBASC can apply for Phase 2 if they continue to meet the eligibility requirements.

<u>Accounts Payable</u>: Accounts payable are continuing to work to ensure suppliers are paid as quickly as possible to assist with their cash flow requirements.

<u>Financial Management</u>: The impact of Covid-19 on the Council's financial position has improved since the receipt of the rates wavier support from the Department. Budgets and cash flow continue to be monitored closely.

#### Planning:

• The Planning Department is operating in accordance with the revised time frames set out by the Ministerial Orders. The Orders disregard the period from the 29 March 2020 to the 23 May 2020 (inclusive), 56 days/8 weeks, when calculating statutory timeframes.



• The Planning counter is operating on an appointment only basis for the viewing of live applications. Customers continue to be encouraged to use our online services.

#### **Corporate Affairs:**

- The AGM took place remotely, with the new Cathaoirleach, being present in the Council Chamber.
- Deputations continued to be held remotely.
- Group Leaders' meetings continue to be held on a monthly basis.
- The Communications Unit continue to provide information in relation to our services during Covid and continue to be active on all our media platforms.







#### Road Safety, Cycling and Sustainable Travel

Sports clubs in the County have been invited to apply for cycle parking via the online Public Consultation Hub and a press release was issued on May 14<sup>th</sup>, 2021 to encourage clubs to apply by September 2021.

#### Traffic Advisory Group (TAG)

There were no TAG meetings held remotely in July 2021.

#### **Bus Connects**

The Core Bus Corridor (CBC) schemes are progressing through Final Design stage and planning applications are being prepared. A Preliminary Business Case for the overall BusConnects Dublin programme has been submitted to the Department of Transport for its review and for Government decision in accordance with the Public Spending Code governing capital projects. Assuming a positive determination of the Preliminary Business Case, the NTA intends to submit planning applications for approval to An Bord Pleanála as quickly as is feasible thereafter, most likely during October/November of this year. This



triggers a formal statutory public consultation process in respect of each of the standalone Core Bus Corridor schemes, with submissions to be made directly to An Bord Pleanála for their consideration. During this process, the finalised Environmental Impact Assessment Reports, inclusive of traffic impact analyses, will be published and available for inspection (including online) and purchase. The public will then have the formal opportunity to have their views heard and considered by An Bord Pleanála as part of the statutory consultation process to inform An Bord Pleanála's assessment of each of the stand-alone Core Bus Corridor schemes.

#### **Dundrum ABTA - Area Based Transport Assessment**

Work on this project is progressing and the ABTA Stage 1- Baseline Assessment, which will form the basis for the study has been completed. Work on the ABTA Stage 2 – Setting the Policy Context and identifying potential transport interventions is now underway.

#### **Dundrum – Bus Interchange Project**

Initial discussions have commenced with the NTA on this project which aims to address the need for improvements to bus interchange facilities in Dundrum to cater for the planned service increases under the BusConnects New Dublin Area Bus Network. Meetings/workshops are ongoing to progress this work and a multi-disciplinary group from the Council is in place to assist.

#### **Dun Laoghaire - Bus Interchange Project**

Similar to the Dundrum Bus Interchange Project, the NTA have commenced discussions with DLRCC to address the need for improvements to bus facilities in Dun Laoghaire to cater for the planned service increases under the BusConnects New Dublin Area Bus Network. Meetings/workshops are ongoing to progress this work and a multi-disciplinary group from the Council is in place to assist.

#### Old Conna ABTA - Area Based Transport Assessment

Work on this project had been put on hold pending further engagement with the NTA regarding the review of the Transport Strategy for the GDA and the transport infrastructural requirements to support new development areas in the southeast of the county. It is now anticipated that work on this project will recommence in September 2021

# 3.Water & Drainage

#### Drainage and Flood Alleviation

Engineering and Environmental Consultants were appointed in Dec 2019 for Flood Risk Management works on the Deansgrange Stream. This is a 4-to-5-year project. Activities completed to date include additional survey work, CCTV surveys, a Constraints study, Hydrological analysis, and hydraulic modelling. Initial Public Consultation is now complete. Optioneering, environmental surveys and engagement with key stakeholders are underway. A Ground Investigation has commenced at key sites where alleviation measures may be practicable.

Work is now substantially complete on the Deansgrange stream advance contract, namely the Kilbogget Park Flood Storage Structure. The new screen will be taken back under the control of Drainage Operations at the end of July.

Engineering and Environmental Consultants have also been appointed for Flood Risk Management Works on the Carrickmines/Shanganagh Rivers. This is a 5+ year project. Data gathering is underway. A Flow/Rainfall Survey commenced on site in February and is now complete. The topographical survey has been completed and CCTV surveys are



underway. Early damage/benefits assessments are underway to ensure a cost: beneficial scheme is achievable. It is planned to hold an initial public engagement event later in the year.

Drainage Section is working closely with the OPW as they commence the update process of the published flood maps as required by the EU Floods Directive. Hydraulic modelling of the Dundrum Slang Stream is complete. Flood maps have been completed and will be uploaded shortly by the OPW to their website.

The Monkstown environs flood risk mapping project is underway. Initial data gathering work has commenced and a topographical survey contract has commenced.

- Workforce have continued operating on staggered roster arrangements to maintain social distancing requirements

# 7. Dún Laoghaire Harbour

#### **COVID-19 Measures**

All services have resumed throughout the Harbour in line with Government guidelines

#### **Harbour Safety Patrol Boat**

This initiative is progressing well and has been broadly welcomed by all water users.

#### Filming

Filming activity is beginning to increase as the national Covid-19 restrictions reduce, and some firm bookings are now being made. A US series production is licencing offices for 2-3 months June -Aug.

#### **Drive-in Covid Test Centre**

Randox Travel Health Care have opened a temporary drive-in COVID-19 test centre in the HSS compound on a trial basis for 3 months. The tests can be booked on-line for those requiring them for work or essential travel. The centre opened for business on Monday 22<sup>nd</sup> February. Randox have agreed a further 3-month licence to 22<sup>nd</sup> August. This is likely to be extended to year end with the opening up of foreign travel in July.

#### Projects:

#### **National Watersports Campus**

DLRCC in partnership with Irish Sailing and the Irish Underwater Council have been approved in principal for Stream 1 grant funding for the development of a National



Watersports Campus. We are working with the Infrastructure & Climate Change Department to respond to requests for additional information from the grant funders in order to secure the grant for the project.

#### **Berth 2 Fenders**

A project to replace the Berth 2 fenders has been given approval to proceed to design / tender stage. RPS Group have been appointed to carry out the design and procurement for this project. This project was tendered and we are awaiting the full tender report to return to the Project Governance Board for approval to proceed to construction.

#### West Pier Survey

Malachy Walshe & Partners have been appointed to carry out a full condition survey of the West Pier and to report on the prioritisation of any repair works deemed necessary. The Roundhead survey element has concluded, with the final report to issue in the coming weeks.

#### St. Michaels Pier Sheet Pile Wall Survey

Doran Consulting have been appointed to carry out a full condition survey of the metal sheet pile wall that contains the infilled HSS vehicle compound area. This wall has never been surveyed previously, and the survey report will be important in determining the level of corrosion and future maintenance requirements of the wall. This survey is now completed and we are awaiting the report.

#### **Real Estate Negotiations**

- The 1st Floor of Block 2, Harbour Square is vacant and advertised for lease. There has been some interest in recent weeks.
- The DMYC lease was presented to the Elected Members in February and is now awaiting signature to complete.
- Negotiations have been recommenced with the INSS on renewal of their lease, having been delayed by Covid-19.

#### **Ferry Terminal**

Planning permission was granted for the ferry terminal project on the 7<sup>th</sup> February 2020. A planning appeal was lodged to An Bord Pleanála. An Bord Pleanála have now granted permission for the development.

A business briefing on the ferry terminal proposal was delivered to the elected members by Hilary Haydon on the 25th of February 2020. This matter will be brought to Area Committees and Full Council in the coming months for disposal pursuant to Section 183 of the Local Government Act 2001.

#### **Dún Laoghaire Harbour and Town Studies**

Work is underway on developing the Economic Plans for Dún Laoghaire Harbour and Dún Laoghaire Town. The Stakeholder Engagement Campaign underpins both plans that will generate new ideas for the sustainable regeneration of the Town and the Harbour. The stakeholder engagement in respect of the Harbour Plan was completed on 28<sup>th</sup> Feb 2021. Indecon consultants are now finalising their plan for issue in the coming months.

#### **Cruise Ship Business**

Due in part to Brexit, and additional space required for customs checks, Dublin Port has reached capacity. They have therefore reallocated their main Cruise Ship berth to a freight shipping company. This has resulted in an increase in Cruise Ship Tender bookings for Dun Laoghaire Harbour in 2022. We are currently formulating plans for how to receive and welcome these Tender calls throughout next year.

As part of the compliance phase of the project, Fáilte Ireland conducted a site visit to the proposed location of the project. This project has progressed to phase 2 compliance and it is hoped to appoint a design team in September in preparation of a planning application.

#### **DLR Tourism Press Trip**

On June 29<sup>th</sup> & 30<sup>th</sup> six journalists were escorted around a number of the county's visitor experiences, including The Brian Broú (boat) Dalkey Castle & Heritage Centre, Glencullen Adventure Park and Zipit Forest Park. # Architects

#### Energy

Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown County Council has improved its energy performance by 51% in 2020 (the public sector target for 2020 was 33%) compared to the baseline year of 2009. The new 50% carbon reduction target to 2030 and shift in the baseline from 2009 to an average of between 2016-2018 sets a more challenging target for the local authority over this decade. DLR is currently at 44% reduction on this basis. The biggest challenge will be reaching the BER B for buildings owned by DLR. Significant resources are required to meet this government requirement.

#### **Age Friendly**

2 consultations in relation to the review of the Age Friendly Strategy were held with internal and external stakeholders.

The High Security Lock Scheme for older people was launched on 23 July with an application deadline of 20 August.

#### Grants

The Community Enhancement Programme (CEP) 2021 closed on 16<sup>th</sup> July. The key theme of this year's CEP programme is supporting groups as they re-open facilities which have been closed due to COVID-19. 42 applications were received. The LCDC will consider these at its meeting in September.

#### **Community Clean Up Days**

Armed with bags, gloves, litter pickers and a strong sense of purpose, local residents, Crosscare and Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council Community Development team got to work cleaning Ballyogan's green spaces and streets as part of a local initiative by Ballyogan Estate Management to clean up their area. The extremely successful event took place on the 10<sup>th</sup> July and resulted in over 30 bags of rubbish being collected.

Following on from this successful day Furry Hill was the next estate where the community came out in force and rolled up their sleeves and made a huge difference to their area in Partnership with South Side Partnership, LBS Mens Shed, Crosscare and Dún Laoghaire Rathdown County Council on the 25<sup>th</sup> July. By the end of the sunny day not a weed was a visible on the curbs and each bin area was scrubbed out. Over 25 bags of rubbish was collected.

#### Festival in a Van

On the 6<sup>th</sup> July Someone's Karl Flood joined us to travel the highways and byways of Glenageary, Sallynoggin and Glasthule with a medley of favourites from Frank Sinatra to Abba to Dean Martin. Of course, there was dancing. Oh, and ice creams too...

On the 7<sup>th</sup> July Karl Flood sang sultry songs in the summer sunshine to the communities in Loreto Court, Kilcross and Simpsons Hospital enjoyed by all while munching on ice cream.

#### **Community Response to COVID-19:**

- Helpline and email address set up and promoted across all communication channels
- Operates 7 days a week from 9 am to 5 pm
- The Community Call Helpline has dealt with 4,479 calls since it commenced on 30 March 2020 and issues range from shopping, pension, medical, loneliness and isolation
- 18 calls were received in July. The majority of the calls relate to requests in relation to the HSE vaccination programme.
- The Community Response Forum is meeting every two months at present to support in coordinating the provision of a multi-agency response to the individuals in the community that are negatively impacted arising from the measures implemented by the Government to stem the spread of Covid 19.

#### dlr Choice - Local Live Performance Programming Scheme

dlr Choice is a Season of Summer Shows under the Local Live Performance Scheme funded by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sport and Media. A call out for dlr based musicians and performers was widely advertised, and the season is programmed and curated by Schweppe Curtis Nunn.

It will feature more than 50 performing acts: from children's entertainers to jazz quartets; comedians to singer songwriters; classical music to electronica; and opera to trad. bringing the thrill and joy of live performance back to public outdoor spaces at the Walled Garden in Marlay Park, Moran Park at dlr LexIcon Library, Myrtle Square off George's Street, the garden at Dundrum Library an Blackrock Park.

The young people did an incredible job and we hope they are really proud of what they've achieved!

# **Libraries**


All dlr Library spaces re-opened to the public on Monday 10 May, as part of a gradual, responsible resumption of onsite library services in line with <u>Government guidelines</u>. Services available during this phase include:

Return and borrowing of items, quick browse visits with restricted numbers in place and a return to usual staffed opening hours with late evenings and Saturday opening. Printing from home, from a personal device, or from a designated quick-use PC and use of self-service photocopiers is permitted while use of Surfbox <u>postal printing service</u>, for next day delivery, and the availability of all our online services continues. The national reserves system remains operational during this phase as does the national delivery service for inter-county reservations.

However, as per Government guidelines for this phase, we are unable at present to provide any service which involves seating, including access to general seating or study spaces. We are unable at this time to provide full access to Internet PCs/laptops, or to programme live indoor events in our spaces. During this phase, numbers permitted at organised outdoor events = 200 attendees.

#### **Book Drop Service**

Since the re-opening of library spaces, and the continuing roll-out of the national vaccination programme, the number of calls to the Book Drop Service has continued to decline. Over **1,900** calls have been received since April 2020, with over **11,600** books delivered to the elderly and most vulnerable members or our community. Book deliveries, where still required, are made by the dlr Library driver



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#### dlr Libraries Online

While in this phase, we continue with our events programme in an online environment in the main. Small organised outdoor events are permitted in line with public health guidelines.

All our online services/resources remain available. You just need your library card number and your PIN, and it's all free!

Borrowbox & Overdrive - download eBooks and eAudiobooks

PressReader - read newspapers

Overdrive- read magazines & comics

Transparent Language Online – learn a language

Universal Class – take a course

With library spaces now open again, members can call in to collect the chosen titles or continue to download them from our e-book platforms Overdrive and Borrowbox. Blackrock Library book club for adults also met online in July.

#### Summer Stars 2021

Summer Stars is the national annual reading incentive programme run in all public libraries across Ireland, from the middle of June until the end of August. It encourages children to keep reading during the school holidays, as it's been shown that reading ability takes a dip during the summer break. All children are invited to take part by registering at their local library. Every child taking part gets a Summer Stars Reading card and is challenged to read 8 books. Stamps are awarded for every book read, and there are some great fun incentives for those who complete a Reading Card. All cards are entered into our grand Prize Draw where prizes include a family pass for Airfield, multi-sport camp and family swim tickets from dlr Leisure, and vouchers for Nimble Fingers.

In July we programmed drawing workshops online with author Mags Suggs and Biodiversity workshops with The Rediscovery Centre. We also programmed a Harry Potter-themed craft workshop. Library staff also continued to host online storytime sessions and post book recommendations on our social media platforms.

As part of our Summer Stars programme 2021, we continued to promote our 2 new Sceal Trails, in Cabinteely Library Garden and in Dundrum Library Garden, and the books that inspired them - *The Vanishing Lake* and *Spidey*.

Over 900 children had registered with dlr Libraries for the Summer Stars Programme by the end of July. The initiative runs until the end of August 2021.

- **Urban Outdoor Adventure Project** working with Open Spectrum to organise a series of outdoor adventure activities for teenagers with Autism.
- **COVID-19 Club Small Grants Scheme** Round 2 was opened for applications from 12th July to the 9th August to support clubs in return to sport.
- **Outdoors Yoga** delivering a new beginners programme for adults that is taking place beside the harbour (29 participants).
- Walking For Health new 4-week walking programme started on the 27th July in Marlay Park (22 participants).
- Active Dublin National Lead Officer role has been filled (Limerick LSP). Some projects being promoted under Active Dublin to start delivery.
